GREATER safety for local children playing at a town fountain is a highlight of a Riverland council's recently completed riverfront redesign.

Renmark Paringa Council is today set to unveil the completed stage 1A of its Urban Design Framework initiative – known as the Taylor Riverfront Precinct – marked by the turning-on of the reinstated Renmark town fountain.

Renmark Paringa Council Mayor Neil Martinson (pictured) said the remodelled river front included improved amenities for locals and visitors to the town.

"It's probably just a couple weeks behind schedule," Mr Martinson said.

"We're hoping the fountain will be turned on (today) and after a few tidy-ups we'll be in full operation. It's a great expanse with the barbecues, the seating, the shaded areas and all the additional trees and plantings."

Double delight



Aboriginal inquiry to help 'grow, prosper'

STATEMENTS a parliamentary inquiry into Aboriginal organisations is unfairly targeting the indigenous are "hypocritical" according to a local community figure.

A group of prominent indigenous South Australians recently sent a letter to Premier Steven Marshall in response to his call for a parliamentary inquiry into governance in community-controlled Aboriginal organisations (Pioneer 10/2/21, 'Investigation Announced').

Gerard Council liaison officer Tyson Lindsay said holding the inquiry was necessary for economic and social progress in the community.

"The letter is very hypocritical as this inquiry is super necessary in many ways and will help our evolution as people and culture for future generations," Mr Lindsay said.

"The inquiry will be a step in the right direction for us to grow and prosper.

"This letter also shows the problem trying to be the solution when it should be the other way around.

"This inquiry is being driven by the indigenous communities themselves through leaders that have no desire for personal gain, but only want to see the voiceless having a voice and sense of purpose."

Mr Lindsay said a majority of

individuals in indigenous communities supported the call for an inquiry.

"I want to reassure the Premier that he has the backing of at least 80 per cent of the people in these communities regarding the inquiry," he said. The letter – signed by 15 indigenous figures – accuses the State Government of unfairly targeting Aboriginal organisations.

"We are concerned that your proposal seems to suggest Aboriginal people or organisations are less capable of managing their own affairs than other South Australians," it reads.

"Despite almost daily reports of non-Aboriginal companies entering liquidation or administration we don't see calls for a Parliamentary Committee to investigate their governance."

The letter said media coverage of issues in Gerard – and evidence to be given during the inquiry – would have negative impacts on families and individuals.

"We are particularly concerned with some of the commentary, public statements and social media posts regarding Aboriginal organisations and their governance," it read.

"These have included personal vilification, attacks and significant breaches of important cultural protocols.

"Regardless of the conditions

placed around the giving or reporting of evidence, allowing and encouraging people to prosecute their personal grievances under Parliamentary privilege risks great harm to individuals, tearing families apart and damaging communities

"It would be unfortunate if the harm this inquiry might cause was remembered as your legacy in Aboriginal Affairs."

Mr Marshall earlier this month called for the inquiry after evidence obtained by the Murray Pioneer in December revealed misappropriation of State Government grant funding – and the sale of council water allocations – had occurred in Gerard.

Plans for the UDF were initially released by council in May 2017, with the project supported by \$1.4 million coming from the Federal Government's Building Better Regions Fund and \$550,000 from the State Government's Places for People Program.

Mr Martinson said the re-designed area had higher levels of safety for local children seeking to play in the town fountain.

"The fountain will be available for the public and there's going to be water jets through the concrete area surrounding it," he said.

"So if the kids want to get in there and have a play that's fine, whereas previously that was very dangerous, with water making the rocks slippery.

"This will be SA Water filtered water going through the fountain and there's no danger to the kids at all.


"There's also a fence to protect any kids playing on the lawn area, so that's not going straight out onto the main road."

Mr Martinson said council would examine the potential of increasing car parks and improving pedestrian safety near the river front.

"We'll be looking at increased parking, particularly on Fifteenth Street," he said.

"One of the main things we're focused on is crossing over the central lawn by the clock and crossing over the main road, so council is looking at that.

"That will take consultation with DPTI because it is their road, (but) we need to make sure it's completely safe."

Birthing service suspension 'may be extended'

SUSPENSION of birthing services at the Waikerie Hospital could continue past the scheduled reopening date while staff are sourced, according to a health network chief executive.

The temporary suspension – which began in mid-January and immediately saw five local women forced to find alternative locations to give birth was initially expected to be lifted at the end of March, however Riverland Mallee Coorong Local Health Network (RMCLHN) CEO Wayne Champion said yesterday that period "may need to be extended until new midwives are recruited"

Mr Champion said the network is "actively recruiting" to fill the roster required to provide safe birthing services for the future.

"Our number one priority in the provision of birthing services is always the health, safety and wellbeing of both mother and baby," he said.

"Birthing services at transferred waikerie Health Service birthing sites."

require a GP obstetrician, a GP anaesthetist, as well as a 24x7 roster of midwives and operating theatre

staff to provide safe delivery and care in the event of an emergency.

"We are also working closely with MEDSTAR, SA Ambulance Service (SAAS), Women's and Children's Hospital, Riverland General Hospital and Loxton Hospital to ensure all women have access to safe birthing services.

"Shared care antenatal and postnatal community services continue to be available at Waikerie Health Service during this time.

"The temporary suspension is expected to be between January to the end of March 2021, however it may need to be extended until new midwives are recruited."

Renmark firefighters mourn the loss of former colleague

A FORMER Riverland resident and firefighter who was killed in a truck crash near the SA-Victorian border is being remembered by former colleagues as a generous volunteer and an "all-around good bloke".

Steven Lawrie, 46, died when his B-double crashed into the back of a stationary truck in Serviceton last Thursday night as vehicles queued to enter South Australia following the announcement of a hard border closure.

The truck that had been stationary subsequently collided with another B-double in front of it, with all three vehicles catching fire.

The exact cause of the collision is under investigation.

Mr Lawrie, of Parafield Gardens, had worked as a retained firefighter at the Renmark MFS station for nearly 15 years before he moved away from the region last March due to other work commitments.

MFS regional commander Garrick Lehmann sent his condolences to Mr Lawrie's family.

"He was a community-minded and active person, and was well-appreciated and respected by his colleagues," he said.

Renmark MFS station officer John McNaughton said Mr Lawrie was generous with his time and well-liked by friends and co-workers.

"He was very well-respected by all the other 'firies'," Mr McNaughton said.

"Whenever anything needed doing

around the station, he was the first to volunteer and he was also always volunteering in the community.

"It didn't matter what it was, whether we were doing a display down the street or putting on sausage sizzle, he always stuck his hand up.

"He was just an all-around nice

Mr McNaughton said Mr Lawrie's former colleagues were mourning his death.

"On the fireground he really knew his stuff and was a good firefighter – always reporting for calls," he said.

"Even though he resigned about 12 months ago, once you are a firefighter you are considered a brother even if you leave, so the boys are missing him."

Mr Lawrie was also remembered for his contributions to local football as a coach, umpire and volunteer, and as a passionate supporter of the Paringa Football Club.

The club offered its condolences through a Facebook post published last Friday

"On behalf of the club, we would like to send our condolences to Hamish Lawrie and family on the passing of Steve," the post said.

"Steve was a very loyal Swannies supporter who was always there to offer his services.

"He helped with colts' trainings, umpiring senior and junior games and many other duties over recent times.

"Your shift is now over."

A PROPOSAL to build a new service station and car wash in Glossop has sparked debate amongst the local community, as Berri Barmera Council seeks public feedback on the development application.

The application proposes the replacement of the former petrol station on Anderson Terrace – next to the Glossop Motel – with a new Caltex station, which is set to include car and truck wash stations and a dog wash.

Yvette Stoodley, who owns the property next door to the site, organised a meeting last Wednesday with other Glossop residents who have concerns about the redevelopment.

"There's no way we want to have a truck and car wash, dog wash and fuel pumps right next door to our bedrooms," Ms Stoodley

"For it to work it is going to be so noisy... plus there will be more trucks and cars com-

"They're not going to have any consideration for the people that live there or the motel's clients.

"It's going to depreciate the value of our properties immediately, and it's also going to do more damage to our road infrastructure."

Shell Get and Go Glossop director Huss Khan, who has put forth the development application, said concerns about noise were unfounded.

'Obviously, with the EPA there are certain guidelines that we have to follow," he said.

"Our plans have been given the green light from the EPA, so there will be sound proofing on all the walls and everything is above board.

"They are worried about music being played loudly as well, but there are strict rules with that and people have to turn their cars and their radios off.

"A lot of the things that were said at the meeting that have found their way back to me were nonsense.

"The EPA is very strict – you have to follow their guidelines or you'll be shut down.

"We're not investing that much money into a town and a car wash just for it to be shut down."

Mr Khan said the new business would provide more jobs in the town and would fill a currently empty building.

"With Glossop turning 100, if we can introduce a car wash into the town it will improve the town and make that site look better as well," he said.

"It will also bring more jobs and money to the community - an absolute minimum of five new jobs and likely more.

"Bringing in new jobs and helping the

community, that's probably the best part about it all."

However, Ms Stoodley said the car wash should be built further away from residences or on the current Shell site.

"Who wants all this in a quiet town?" she said.

"We moved to the area because it was nice and quiet and, yes, there was a fuel station

next door but it closed at 8pm every evening. "We've already got a build-up of traffic, and this will create more."

Mr Khan said traffic would continue to travel through Glossop, regardless of whether the new station is built.

"There's a lot of traffic because of Berri Estates and all the road trains who have to come through here because they can't go through Renmark because of the Paringa Bridge," he said.

"By us opening there, we're not bringing trucks from the highway and telling them they have to come through Glossop.

"We've had plenty of residents who have said they are all for it.

"The more new things the Riverland gets, the better it is for everybody – that's the way I see it."

Berri Barmera Council is currently accepting feedback on the application, which is available to view at the council office in Berri from Monday to Friday between 9am

Feedback must be submitted in writing and reach the chief executive officer by this Friday, February 19.

Inquiry required, despite protests

POLARISING is the best word to describe opinion on the State Government inquiry into Aboriginal organisations.

A recent Murray Pioneer report revealed a shocking list of alleged transgressions at Gerard Council.

The accusations surrounded public monies allegedly being routinely misused and misdirected, not reaching their intended targets, and subsequently not helping the people they were directed towards.

In announcing the inquiry earlier this month, Premier Steven Marshall – who doubles as the Minister for Aboriginal Affairs and Reconciliation - cited "mounting concerns among the SA Aboriginal community about poor governance and alleged corruption" within community-run organisations, like the Gerard Council.

Premier Marshall said he believed that "any allegations of corrupt or otherwise criminal activity should be referred to the police".

Importantly, he also stated that he is "strongly committed to the empowerment of South Australian Aboriginal communities to manage their own affairs".

The inquiry's announcement has sparked a predictable, but nonetheless spirited attack from those dead-set against the idea. This counter-offensive has been headlined by a group of prominent indigenous South Australians.

They claim the State Government is unfairly targeting Aboriginal organisations.

The practice of unfairly targeting a group – and therefore its members – based on race and history has a name.

Over the past month we have heard the word used many times, sometimes accurately, other times perhaps too blithely.

A letter from this group of indigenous South Australians says that "despite almost daily reports of non-Aboriginal companies entering liquidation or administration, we don't see calls for a Parliamentary Committee to investigate their governance".

True, many companies do go under, often dragging blameless folk with them.

But are they funded by taxpayers to the extent of the organisations in question?

Perhaps the argument may have been better framed that governments of all tiers routinely waste money without sufficient public scrutiny.

However, that doesn't mean Aboriginal organisations should escape scrutiny, just that more should be done to explore – and guard against – any misuse of public funds.

The letter contains some valid points, noting the many different "potential" regulatory checks, across a list of organisations.

It also says extra funding to "improve governance training and oversight" could address the problem.

Maybe. But maybe it would be a case of throwing good money after bad?

And it mentions the "personal vilification" via public commentary - which almost certainly would have included genuine examples of racism – that has followed the inquiry's announcement.

None of which, however, explains away the need to address the claims, and to ensure that public money set aside to improve outlooks Aboriginal communities goes to the right places.

Safety for all? Or a **Renmark bypass**

I WRITE this as a citizen of the Riverland and my view is not to be taken as a comment from the Renmark Paringa Council, in my role as councillor.

It was interesting to see that Berri Barmera Council has decided that the Renmark bypass should go ahead as a matter of urgency for safety issues, when it is very clear that the very real safety issues we all have as Riverlanders is with driving on the Sturt Highway.

There have been deaths and many crashes – quite apart from many near misses – that we have all seen or been involved with.

However, the safety they appear to be worried about is on a bridge with very few, if any incidents. Did all councils agree that

the priority should be the Sturt Highway, making travel for all residents safer, while attracting tourists who directly support businesses?

If so, it is quite contrary to their 'matter of urgency' to save three minutes on a trip bypassing Renmark.

Which is more important to Riverlanders?

The bypass is a long-term plan for the state and in time it will occur, but which is our most urgent?

Which will save most lives and get us to family and friends in Adelaide safer?

This seems to be a hurried decision without broader consultation or discussions with other councils. It also seems to be against the agreements coming from the Riverland Social Indicators Advocacy Roadmap, as mentioned by Mayor Neil Martinson in his comments. Was that regional priority raised in discussions?

We all know how much better the northern bypass has been for our access to Adelaide. Just imagine if it extended to Waikerie and the very positive impact it would have on tourism, with safer access for all.

Trucks on the Sturt Highway are rapidly increasing in numbers and size. They are a growing concern.

What would help us all is a dual-lane highway. In time, we can consider more bridges and the financial impact on over 40 businesses in Renmark with a full and proper study of the options.

In the shorter term, how many trucks will save significant time travelling along a dual-lane highway and not being stuck behind a slow vehicle? Surely a much greater saving than the three minutes quoted for a bypass option?

Fime up for Westpac building?

A RIVERLAND council is set to vote on the possibility of demolishing a prominent riverfront building and adding a future visitor information centre (VIC) at the location.

Renmark Paringa councillors last night – at a special council meeting – voted whether to pass numerous amendments to the draft expression of interest documents for the former Westpac building at 180 Murray Avenue, Renmark, based on the results of a recent public consultation.

A Renmark Paringa Council report said the location's future use was still to be decided.

"There are simple options like creating open space, leasing the property or selling the property..." the report said.

"There are also more complex options like the creation of a future economic opportunity, which until concepts are tested with the market to determine commercial viability, are vague and unknown.

"Council must always make informed decisions that are based on the best available information, and investing the time and effort in obtaining the information to inform those decisions is therefore vital.

"It is intended that the key themes that are identified from the public consultation are distilled and used to refine the desired terms of the expression of interest to be released to the commercial market."

Amendments to the documen-

tation include removal of the existing building "with the possible exception of the art deco facade", incorporating an area of open space on the river side of the site, plus "a modern and fit-forpurpose VIC within the scope of any future economic opportunity".

The report said "the majority" of responses received were in favour of demolishing the current building.

"The consultation drew out some differing thoughts between the retention or demolition of the existing building," the report said.

"Some of those wanting eco-

nomic activation of the site saw benefit in retaining and refurbishing the existing building due to the heritage value... and others saw greater value of beginning with a greenfield site.

"Those that are interested in retaining it seem to appreciate the architectural aesthetics, as it integrates with other art deco buildings through the town.'

The report said concerns were raised regarding the number of available parking spaces at the

"There is a reasonable provision of on-street parking in the vicinity of the site and the long vehicle bays – for those towing or in recreational vehicles - are approximately 100 metres away on Renmark Avenue," the report

"While not having a dedicated on-site car park for the site may present a planning challenge, there are approximately 778 car parks within 300 metres of the

Westpac confirmed to council in March 2020 it would depart the premises in order to occupy a shared-location with BankSA at 2 Ral Ral Avenue.

A RIVERLAND program helping clients battle drug addiction is hoping its success during a two-year pilot period will be enough to secure long-term funding.

The Riverland Matrix Pilot Program, operated by PsychMed and funded by the State Government, was contracted for two years starting in January 2019, with the pilot ending at the start of 2021.

The Berri PsychMed office closed at the end of January, with staff working out of other locations when doing regular clinical visits to the Riverland for gambling treatment programs or Better Access mental health sessions.

PsychMed clinical psychologist Dr Quentin Black said staff were in the process of finalising a report to the Government on the program's success.

"There were many significant clinical outcomes, including decreased use, strong abstinence and recovery rates, and significant improvements in measures for urge, dependency, depression, social function and quality of life," he said.

"There were... fantastic outcomes at the individual level for participants and their families.

"We also saw a number of fantastic secondary outcomes. For example, four young trainees from rural SA received training in clinical psychology and AOD (alcohol and other drugs) work

"One trainee has completed her clinical masters and is one of the very small number of clinical psychologists working in rural SA for SA Health, while another is completing her masters this year and two more are completing the second year of

their internships.

"Of the two lived-experience mentors, one has now gone on to full-time employment and the other provides support to people in rural Aboriginal communities."

Dr Black said despite the pilot program ending, several locals were continuing to receive assistance from PsychMed to complete the program.

"There are about four people completing the pro-

gram by telehealth," he said.

"We will also be following up with the more than 60 people who participated over the two years following their completion of the 16-week intensive component."

Dr Black said PsychMed would continue to provide clinical psychology support in the region, including with problem gambling.

PsychMed are expected to provide their report to the State Government later this month.

More local support for euthanasia Bill

MORE Riverlanders will speak up about their support of voluntary euthanasia following an information session in Berri on Saturday, event organisers claim.

Questions about safeguards and palliative care were covered at the session, along with some mythbusting, ahead of the Voluntary Assisted Dying Bill hitting State Parliament – as soon as next month.

Approximately 50 people attended the session and a petition – also circulated in Waikerie last week – was available for attendees to sign, targeting Member for Chaffey, Tim Whetstone, who made headlines in 2016 over his decision to vote against a voluntary euthanasia Bill that was defeated 24-23.

Organiser Angie Miller, who met with Mr Whetstone this week, said she expected more locals to be vocal in their backing of the controversial and emotive Bill.

"I felt encouraged that many who attended are willing to take their support further in whatever capacity that are able to do so, whether that is contacting Tim Whetstone or talking with their friends and family," she said.

"This meeting is a clear indication that the momentum in the Chaffey electorate is certainly building.

"I could feel a real desire in people, not just wanting to show their support towards the issue but also wanting to make a very informed view that they could then share with others."

The session featured several guest speakers, including a cancer sufferer and a spokesperson from Voluntary Assisted Dying SA. Aldgate-based Ms Miller said "many questions" were answered and fears allayed.

"Of particular interest is the fact that this Bill mirrors the Victorian legislation and has 68 safeguards," she said.

"This includes the need for two VAD (voluntary assisted dying) trained doctors to assess that you have a terminal illness. Doctors and medical staff are not allowed to raise the issue with you. The request has to come from the per-

"Many myths were discussed. Among them, the notion of killing someone.

"Under this legislation not one

more person is going to die. This is about the choice not to suffer.

"We also discussed the myth that this issue is for elderly people when in fact it is for people over the age of 18 with a terminal illness"

Debate around palliative care also featured at the session.

"With many attendees having had first-hand experience in this area, the need for access to quality palliative care was well understood," Ms Miller said.

"We were also able to inform people that in jurisdictions where VAD legislation was introduced, palliative care funding was actually increased"

Despite the meeting being pro-VAD, Ms Miller said the importance of respecting all views on the topic was stressed.

"Something that really stood out at the meeting was the issue of choice," she said. "There seemed to be a real general consensus that it's okay not to support VAD.

"However, there is no need to get in the way of those that do want to access it."

Ms Miller said in addition to the implementation of voluntary assisted dying legislation, the VAD campaign aimed to promote increased funding for palliative care and advanced care directives.

Petition circulates Riverland

A PETITION supporting the voluntary euthanasia bill currently in State Parliament has collected nearly 300 signatures across the Riverland in the past week, following information distribution in Waikerie and Renmark, and an event forum in Berri.

The petition for Voluntary Assisted Dying 2020 (VAD) collected over 80 signatures at Waikerie last Wednesday.

"We do get detractors on social media, but at meetings and petition signature collections, people are always very supportive," said local spokesperson and VAD advocate Jan Kemble.

"Another set of advocates collected over 200 signatures during two days at the Renmark Plaza last week, and a meeting held at Berri on Sunday had a really good response.

"The VAD petition has had very little direct negativity throughout the Riverland despite anyone's personal opinions. People know this is a sensitive issue, and those on the fence who have decided to come forward and ask questions have always been respectful."

The VAD 2020 Bill was introduced by Labor in State Parliament last December, and petitions supporting the Bill are currently circulating the Riverland.

Mrs Kemble was a speaker at the Berri Hotel meeting on Sunday, sharing her reasons for supporting the Bill and sad losses of family and friends she believed would have benefitted from VAD.

She started the petitions earlier this year, targeting Member for Chaffey Tim Whetstone, who voted against a voluntary euthanasia bill in 2016. Mr Whetstone was invited to the Berri Hotel event, but did not attend due to a prior commit-

"A lot of supporters came to the meeting to listen and share stories, ask questions," she said. "We were also aware that a few people in the crowd were on the fence about the Bill, but no one spoke up.

A COMMITMENT to revitalising empty shops in Renmark has helped a Riverland business network defy trends caused by COVID-19

Renmark Paringa Network chair Clint Lewan said the organisation was likely to reach its "best possible" result – outlined by Pat Mickan at a meeting of local businesses owners in November 2019 - of having more than 160 members by July.

"It's really humbling to get kudos from

people on council who say we've exceeded expectations," Mr Lewan said.

"As a board when we look at what we've done it is massive... we're up over 100 members now.

"Our top of the range goal was to have 165 members signed up by the end of June 2021, because that was the number Pat Mickan had on her contact list at the time.

"That was the best possible scenario and that now is seriously within reach. I think we may well reach it, which is huge.'

Mr Lewan said the network hoped to hold

more information sessions and events for business owners this year.

"The members haven't had the value-add stuff we were promising because of COVID, like the networking and speaking events," he said. "We are going to have quite a bit coming up before the end of financial year."

Mr Lewan said confidence remained among Renmark shop operators despite the economic impacts of COVID-19,

"Renmark's had 22 brick and mortar businesses open in the last 18 to 24 months (and) that's incredibly impressive during a time like 2020 with COVID," he said.

"We can't sit on our laurels as it could easily go back to where we were 18 months ago. It's so important now for our locals to go and support these shops.

"The tourists are here on average maybe three or four months a year, and for the rest of the time they are relying on locals.

"If you want your main shopping precincts to remain vibrant and full, then get into town and get behind those businesses that are giving it a go.'

Mr Edwards said he enjoyed being involved with the Mardi Gras over the years and thought it was a great event for the district.

"In the past, as a fundraising event for the community, it's been a great support," he said.

"I think in recent times the funds raised have not been great as in the past, but there's still a lot of money raised and a lot of promotion for the district and I think it is a great support for the town."

Mr Edwards said his main source of fundraising so far was through local bingo nights.

"I've had amazing support

with that, and there's been personal donations that have come in that have varied from \$10 to \$100," he said.

Mr Edwards' fundraising for the site in previous years helped fund a memorial, installed last year, remembering four RAAF airmen who died after crashing in a paddock near Noora in 1943.

He said his goal this year was to help turn Mill Corner into a "true historical pre-

"I've been quite pleased actually with the progress that's been made with Mill Corner," Mr Edwards said.

'We are hoping to promote and display our history here with some plaques along a historical walk that we have planned.

"The plaques will record things like the town's first post office, the first hospital, and the soldiers' settlement, and other districts like Wunkar, Nadda and more.

'Some of these things took place in the early 1900s and it would be good to have them all recorded individually and prominently."

Soft drink for breakfast is better than juice?

BREAKFAST for me most days is an egg on toast, a glass of orange juice and a flat white coffee with an extra shot.

The egg is lovingly laid by my chooks, the coffee ground from Riverland roasted beans and the "OJ" is 100 per cent Australian, locally grown and produced with no added sugar.

A controversial new health rating system implemented by the Federal Government to help Australians make healthier choices would rate my breakfast more nutritious if I did away with the juice and substituted it with a can of fizzy diet cola.

Soft drink for breakfast is better? The new 5-star system is based on the

nutritional composition of the item. Protein and fibre add points while saturated fats and sugars decrease the value.

It does not differentiate between natural and added sugars which can lead to junk foods being rated healthier than items with natural sugars, like my breakfast OJ.

The rating does not consider vitamin C nor other nutrients like folates, the natural form of vitamin B9. Folate helps to form DNA and RNA and plays a key role in breaking down homocysteine, which is an amino acid that can be harmful in high amounts.

Folates are needed to grow healthy red blood cells, critical during pregnancy.

For those who got lost in the previous paragraph, chemistry was not my go at school either, but I get the importance of both these vitamins and cannot understand why their value is not included when anyone can see they are good for you.



It beggars belief that drinking carbonated water with synthetic additives - caramel colour, phosphoric and citric acid, aspartame, sodium benzoate, caffeine, acesulfame-potassium – can be more beneficial than 100 per cent fresh orange juice.

Ignoring some nutrients and focusing on sugar content is somewhat deceptive for an overall health rating and maybe it would be more appropriate to call it a sugar rating.

Never mind the jeopardy it places our trus industry in - an industry that emple friends, neighbours and visitors alike. Let's hope consumers have more smarts than those who have developed and supported this new system.

In the meantime my breakfast menu will remain unchanged unless it follows a big night out, when baked beans, mushrooms, fried tomato and bacon will make a guest appearance on the plate.

And to be honest a can of fizzy drink might also be a part of the recovery, but not at the breakfast table.

Total MDBA active storage increasing over the last week by 42GL to 4217GL (50 per cent capacity).

At Dartmouth Reservoir, the storage increased by 25GL to 2432GL (63 per cent capacity).

Over the past week the Hume Reservoir storage increased by 40GL to 1691 GL (56 per cent capacity) following heavy rain upstream of the storage.

The Hume release reduced to a low of 4500 ML/day and is currently around 6500 ML/day.

Downstream at Lock 9 the weir pool continues to vary near FSL.

The Lock 8 and Lock 7 weir pools are 50 cm below FSL as part of the weir pool variability program and are planned to remain at these levels over the coming months.

This week the storage level at Lake Victoria reduced by 21GL to 288GL (43 per cent capacity) as releases continue to supplement Murray flows to meet system demands.

The flow to South Australia continues to target around 8400 ML/day during February.

The flow includes South Australia's normal monthly Entitlement flow, small volumes of consumptive trade and water for the environment.

In February, environmental water holders ordered 30GL of water for the environment, delivered at an additional rate of around 1070

"This means when I get in the "For a really long time, I van and in the passenger's seat. It

Mr Ferrier thanked those who donated their time and funds to help him.

'As soon as the accident happened, my son-in-law and grandkids raised \$1500 in Adelaide," he said.

"Soon after, my friend made a GoFundMe page and a year later after I left Hampstead Rehabilitation Centre, my friends hosted a 'dinner under the stars' fundraising event for me at the Berri Water Ski Club.

"Just from that night more than \$20,000 was raised.

"I cannot thank enough those who donated to make the night possible and those who were generous in their donations to me.



Network welcoming shared space tenants **HUGH SCHUITEMAKER**

THE launch of a local business network's major shared space initiative is aimed at supporting Riverlanders with new commercial ideas, or needing a temporary office space.

The Renmark Paringa Network last month opened its retail and business shared spaces located at the Chaffey Colonnades.

Renmark Paringa Network chair Clint Lewan said the retail hub initiative allowed new or existing businesses a low-risk opportunity to open a shopfront.

"People started using the retail hub at the beginning of January," Mr Lewan said.

"It's still not 100 per cent finished, but it will be very shortly and people will be taking tenancies in there.

"It's a lot cheaper than having to go out and sign your own lease, and then have your outgoings and your overheads, because we cover everything within the rental payment.

"People who might have a home-based business can come to us and hire a professional space that is set up beautifully. It's all furnished and everything is taken care of."

The retail hub is currently being used by Cate and Paige Designs, and the Riverland Artist's Hub.

Mr Lewan said the business hub provided a setting for job interviews or business meetings that could be booked on a "flexible" basis.

"We want to appeal to those people who want an inviting space every now and then to bring customers or clients too," he said.

"It can be booked by the day, for two days, for a week, for a three-month block and the pricing is all dependent on the length of time.

"The business hub has a private meeting room which can be hired out hourly, or you can have an office or board room by the day.

"It's for people who work from home and might want a bit more of a professional setting. One of our RPN members is going to hold job interviews there."

Mr Lewan said tenants of the shared spaces from outside the Renmark Paringa Council would then be able to become network members.

"People can use the spaces and then network, build contacts and work with each other," he

"It allows people from outside the Renmark Paringa Council area to become part of the network by having a space in Renmark."

Mr Lewan said the network had already seen high demand for the shared spaces during holiday and long weekend periods.

"Those popular tourist times around Easter and school holidays are filling up quite quickly," he said.

"We might have one spot left maybe – in the retail hub over Easter.

"It's ideal for people that want

to come into the centre of town where the foot traffic is during those periods." The Renmark Paringa

Network business hub is located at 6/7 Chaffey Colonnades, with the retail hub located at 32 Murray Avenue.

"They've all done very well so far and I'm excited to see how far they've come."



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Berri bench gives locals a place to sit and reflect

A BENCH spreading awareness for suicide prevention and providing a space for those bereaved by suicide to reflect has been installed in Berri.

The reflection seat, donated by the Berri Barmera Council at the request of the Riverland Community Suicide Prevention Network (RCSPN), was unveiled by Mayor Peter Hunt at Martin Bend Reserve during a ceremony last Wednesday.

RCSPN chair Jenni Hampel said the network had unveiled benches in Barmera, Renmark, Loxton and now Berri.

"It feels great that we are covering a lot of the areas in the Riverland now because suicide isn't a concern just for one town or one pocket of the community – it's a concern for everyone," she said.

"I have had some positive feedback from people

saying they have driven past the benches and seen people sitting there.

"I hope everyone feels comfortable to sit on these

"Everything that we put out there in the community about suicide prevention is a positive thing."

Member for Chaffey Tim Whetstone, who spoke at the ceremony, said the RCSPN was a "great support network for suicide prevention".

"In South Australia we know the regions, with the farm economy, have some of the highest rates of suicide, so it's important that as a community we give a level of support to those who are doing it tough," he said.

"It's also important to

acknowledge Val Fewster and CORES, which is about getting people trained to pick the people who are doing it tough and look for the signs, and I

think they are doing an out-

standing ioh

"It's a very serious issue, but it is an issue that is now getting greater prominence.

"The Premier's suicide prevention advocate has now been given more resources so they have a bigger reach.

"I've known a number of farmers who have taken their lives and that's why I'm so passionate about, at every opportunity, making sure I contribute to suicide prevention.

"We all go through challenging periods in our life... and some people need help to get through that.

"This bench is a community beacon so people know they can come down here and reflect and have a conversation with someone if they need to."

Ms Hampel said Waikerie-based support group Silent Ripples was currently working to install reflection seats near the Waikerie silos.

Vaccine causes drop in rotavirus cases

SOUTH Australian public hospital admissions for rotavirus among children under five have dropped by 80 per cent in the past 12 years, according to data released by SA Health last week.

The Department for Health and Wellbeing's communicable disease and control branch director, Dr Louise Flood, said the introduction of a vaccine in 2007 has had a significant impact in reducing rotavirus hospi-

talisation rates.

"Rotavirus infection is a type of gastroenteritis that causes diarrhoea, vomiting, fever and dehydration and can be fatal if it is left untreated," she said.

"Symptoms can last from a few days to a week and people with rotavirus stay infectious for around one week.

"Fortunately, unlike many other strains of viral gastroenteritis, there is a vaccine available which can prevent or reduce the severity of rotavirus in most young children.

"Immunisation not only protects individuals but also vulnerable people in the community who are too young or too unwell to be vaccinated."

The rotavirus vaccine is available for free as part of the National Immunisation Program (NIP) and is offered to children at six weeks of age and four months of age.

Tourism operators 'fear end of JobKeeper'

NEARLY a third of all tourism businesses in the state expect they will have to lay off workers or close when JobKeeper ends next month, according to new survey data from the Tourism Industry Council of South Australia (TICSA).

The latest TICSA Tourism Barometer revealed 29 per cent of operators will shed staff or close their business without JobKeeper, with some respondents saying the program was keeping their business afloat.

Recent statistics show the state's visitor expenditure had fallen from a peak of \$8.1 billion in late 2019 to \$5.6 billion, with Labor blaming the State Government's Great

State voucher program which it says has been "besieged by problems".

State Opposition Leader Peter Malinauskas said he was concerned the sector was "on the cusp of more job losses".

"JobKeeper is set to go next month and tourism businesses are warning many jobs will go with it," he said.

"We cannot just let tourism businesses fall off a cliff next month." Opposition tourism spokesperson Zoe

Bettison said JobKeeper was the keeping many people in work in the tourism sector.

"While the tourism voucher scheme has been welcome, the Marshall Liberal Government has made it too limited, meaning it hasn't provided the full benefit to our tourism sector," she said.



'The installation of the two benches and the renaming of the road in the cemetery were done as a tribute to them.

"A proposal for these changes was brought to and passed by the Community Award Assessment Panel, and then by council at their meeting in September."



Interconnector to avoid Calperum, Hawks Nest wildlife

CONSIDERATION for the habitat of Riverland wildlife has seen alterations made to the plans of a major energy project.

Energy contractor ElectraNet recently finalised a route for the planned power interconnector - known as Project EnergyConnect - running between New South Wales and South Australia.

ElectraNet land services manager Scott Haynes said alterations to the project's initial route would have less impact on Riverland wildlife at Calperum Station and Hawks Nest Station.

"Minimising impacts to the environment has been fundamental in arriving at our preferred corridor for the proposed new transmission line,"

Mr Haynes said.

"To achieve this, extensive specialist studies and consultation, and an assessment of potential environmental and social impacts have all been considered in arriving at the preferred route.

"One of the key outcomes from the studies and consultation has been a change to the alignment we originally proposed through part of Calperum Station and also Hawks Nest."

"The updated route through Calperum Station now follows the eastern and southern boundaries of the property which means it minimises disturbance to areas of critical habitat, and the updated route at Hawks Nest avoids critical habitat by following the

southern boundary."

Conservation group Birdlife Australia – in June 2019 – called for Project EnergyConnect to be rejected due to potential impacts on endangered black-eared miner populations in Calperum

Mr Haynes said further information regarding the environmental effects of Project EnergyConnect could be accessed through ElectraNet's online information portal.

"This detail will be available in the Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) which will be released in April 2021 but visitors to the online room will have the opportunity to read about the preliminary findings and the preferred route before the EIS is released," he said.

An assessment of potential environmental and social impacts have all been considered in arriving at the preferred route...

A 100-year journey through Rotary

A CLASSIC Holden station wagon recently passed through Riverland towns to commemorate 100 years of Rotary in Australia.

Caboolture Queensland Rotary Club project coordinator and secretary Peter Brown, who has been a Rotarian since 1977, said Riverland Rotarians did not disappoint.

Mr Brown said "when you're a Rotarian you're never alone".

"I pull-up at a club and I just send a message that I'm a visiting Rotarian and there is always someone to have a coffee with," he said.

"Once you're a Rotarian, you have an international family.

"If you go to an airport and you've got a Rotary badge on someone will just walk up to you and say 'Hello, I'm a Rotarian from so and so'- suddenly you're like an 'old friends' sort of discussion."

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THE FAIR-WEATHER GARDENER

AS usual the weather takes up a good deal of our thoughts and conversations.

We have had anything but the usual summer. Mainly mild and then a short burst of heat that crisps our plants as it does not allow them to acclimatise. Even my tough old agapanthus have suffered.

Then comes some summer rains, making it easier for fungal diseases to thrive.

I do notice a number of plants that seem to thrive in my garden regardless.

In my area I see geraniums, lantanas, plumbago, sedums and many salvias.

Some, like the delicate-looking cleome, are also doing well, as is the belladonna lily (also known as 'the naked lady'), and the seaside daisy. In the shaded area my hydrangeas are also thriving, but they do have a protected spot that they share with the ornamental ginger, which also has done well.

INDOOR PLANTS

I have written a number of times about the benefit of indoor plants and at this time of the year, when we are loath to spend too much time in the sun, they come into their own.

They provide us with mini-gardens to care for, as well as the health-giving properties and the beauty of their greenery and flowers.

The COVID crisis saw more people opting for a pet, either for company as they spent more time working from home, in isolation, or a playmate for their children.

WARNING: There are quite a few indoor plants that cause problems for pets. Some are the aloe veras, devil's ivy, the sago palm, (sometimes called the cycad), jade plants, and dieffenbachia.

Whether they are inside or on the patio, care should be taken.

A number of pet-friendly plants include: bromeliads, echeverias, calathea, Chinese money plant (pilea peperomioides) or

Boston fern (nephrolepis exaltata).

FEBRUARY

February in the garden can be challenging, and quite unpleasant, with high heat and sometimes high humidity.

This can make some plants susceptible to fungal disease, which will require you to spray a fungicide on these plants

Dead heading is probably top of the list to tidy up the garden and promote Autumn

I always think that our autumn flush of roses is the best as the weather is cooler and the colours don't fade like they do in summer. The roses will also benefit from a summer fertilise and deep watering.

It is also the right time to fertilise camellias, as well as feeding cymbidium orchids. It is time to trim and divide bearded iris. Hellebores can be trimmed at this time

to remove any damaged foliage. Removing dead leaves and flowers from day lilies will make a huge difference to the look of your garden

FRUIT AND VEGETABLES

Keep harvesting your summer vegeta-

Please don't share if you are in a fruit-fly area.

Seeds of spinach, peas, carrots, cauliflower, broccoli, beetroot, silverbeet and radishes can be started now.

If you are running out of room you can try growing some in large pots in a sunny, sheltered spot.

As with your vegetables, don't share any fruit from your garden if you are in a fruitfly area.

Read the literature that PIRSA has left with you and dispose of any fallen fruit correctly.

Citrus fertiliser needs to be watered in well.

SPRING BULBS

Catalogues featuring spring bulbs are appearing now.

But don't be in a rush to plant these as the temperature is far too hot. Wait until April to do any planting.

Bulbs from South Africa are more suited to our climate.

Wait until May if you are intending to try growing tulips or hyacinths. Both need to be chilled in the crisper of your refrigerator for at least six weeks prior to planting.

Keep them in a brown paper bag and make sure they are clearly labelled as these bulbs are poisonous.

In the meantime browse the catalogues and dream of your spring garden.

Health-star rating decision 'blow to the Riverland'

FEDERAL Agriculture Minister David Littleproud says a decision by food regulators to give 100 per cent pure Aussie fruit and vegetable juice a lower health star rating than diet cola is "just madness" and "a blow" to the Riverland.

"This will mean 100 per cent pure orange juice will have a health star rating lower than that of a diet soft drink.

"They have made a mockery of the rating system and have ignored Australian Government and industry concerns. It would appear as though the states that voted for this are beholden to their bureaucrats.

"How can anyone believe that the health star rating for drinks with no nutritional value should be higher than 100 per cent fruit and vegetable juices?

"This is madness and disrespects our country's vegetable and citrus growers and their communities."



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
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Residents and students reflect on Stolen Generations

LOCAL school students and community members came together last week to honour and learn about the Stolen Generations and the lasting impact of that period on Aboriginal communities.

Life Without Barriers, in conjunction with other community groups, hosted a National Apology Day event at the Riverland Cultural Arts Centre in Glossop last Friday, before the 13-year anniversary of the formal apology to the Stolen Generations on Saturday.

Students from Glossop High School and Glossop Primary Community School took part in the ceremony.

Life Without Barriers case worker Sam Mitchell, who led the ceremony, said organisers were happy with community turnout and the participation of local students.

"It was good to see the local students be involved in today's acknowledgment," he said.

"It's very important and vital to get the message of reconciliation to the next generation and the future leaders of our community.

"We have some of our older generation, and some members of the Stolen Generations present, so it's good to honour and acknowledge those members of the community

and create a cultural safe space where we can begin healing and more importantly working together."

Mr Mitchell said he thought awareness of the Stolen Generations and historical mistreatment of indigenous Australians was improving.

"I feel that now, in 2021, a lot has changed since the referendum in 1967 in terms of the treatment and policies," he said.

'We've made some good changes, but like with anything there's still a lot of history to be learnt and taught and a lot of trauma to be healed.

"Overall, you can see by the turnout of Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people, this is a really good acknowledgement.

"It's great that we have a lot of community members and the local media to help spread awareness."

Mr Mitchell said further events this year were also planned to celebrate the local indigenous commu-

"We are planning with Life Without Barriers and some other agencies to do a walk similar to what is done in Adelaide," he said.

'We want to engage with community members and create new ideas, but also stick with what we've already built as well, and that's the importance of having young people around and involved.'

Michael diving in for **Super Swim Challenge**

WAIKERIE sexagenarian Michael Cox is raising money for the Starlight Foundation's Super Swim Challenge.

So far, Mr Cox has raised \$370, swimming just over 3km since beginning in January.

"I was only aiming for \$50,"

The foundation provides sick kids with visits from mascot Captain Starlight and rooms in hospitals dedicated to recreation.

Starlight CEO Louise Baxter said the foundation relies on community contributions.

"Starlight's challenge is that every dollar spent on our vital services must first be raised and Starlight relies on the generosity of the community," she said.

Mr Cox said he has raised the money single-handedly and urged others to get involved.

"Hopefully there will be other people that take up the challenge," he said.

"If anyone wants to join me that would be great."

The Super Swim challenge runs until February 24.

Hugh's cooking adventures **SMOOTHIEBOWL**



I HAVE to confess I've got a bad habit of skipping breakfast most mornings. however, after a recent purchase of some locally grown honeydew melon, I decided to combine it with some of my other favourite fruits to recreate the smoothie bowls now popular in cafes and health stores.



RECIPE

For smoothie base

1/2 cup honeydew melon 6 strawberries

1/2 mango

100ml coconut water

100ml almond milk

Toppings

1/2 banana 3 to 4 strawberries Small handful blueberries Muesli or granola

Chia seeds Cinnamon



METHOD

☐ Remove rind from melon and cut into small cubes. Slice the mango cheek away from the seed and scoop out the flesh from skin.

☐ Remove any stems from the strawberries.

☐ Add coconut water and almond milk to a blender with melon, mango and strawberries, and blend until smooth. Reserve until ready to serve.

☐ Thinly slice the banana and remaining strawberries.

☐ Add smoothie base to a bowl. Top with banana, strawberries, blueberries, muesli, and chia seed.

☐ Sprinkle cinnamon over the top and serve.



One Riverland-born cricket star talks about another...

Rick's big call on Carey

FORMER state cricket selector and Australian Test batsmen Rick Darling has made a bold prediction about Loxton-born Alex Carey's pros-

Darling, from Waikerie, is the most recent Riverland-born cricket player to wear a baggy green, playing 14 Tests from 1978 to 1979.

Following the recent 11th-hour postponement of the South African two weeks ago.

Carey will have to wait until the tour of the West Indies in June for a potential Test debut.

Darling is resolute in the opinion Carey has what it takes to step into the Test team.

"Well, I can see that Alex is going to be the new Adam Gilchrist," he said.

Darling said under-fire Test skipper Tim Paine might be challenged for his spot.

"I would be very worried if I was Tim Paine because obviously Alex can fill in that wicketkeeping role," he said.

"And to have him coming in (batting) at six or seven you can virtually play another all-rounder or another bowler.

"And if he performs there and gets a chance I think he's going to be there for a long time."

Carey, 29, has established a distinguished career across 42 one-day international and 30 T20I appearances.

A recent 101 against Brisbane Heat in January was a timely reminder to the Australian selectors of Carey's influence with the bat.

Darling said in the days he played under captain Ian Chappell selection decisions were made more instinctively.

"Ian Chappell was an advocate of not waiting

until a player has made 2000 first-class runs," he said. "If you are performing at the time, you should get a go.'

"I was lucky because I was performing when I was 20.

"I got a game and a couple of tours after that." That 'time' for Carey might have already arrived, according to Darling.

"Alex is one of those players in demand who can play all formats and he's now ready," he

"But I'm sure he'll take it in his stride and add Test cricket to his repertoire of T20 and oneday cricket.

"He's in the world of professional cricket now and Test cricket is only part of his game."

So why has it taken so long to produce another Test player, like Darling, born and bred in the

"From what I hear it's not going all that well up there," he said.

"In my time as a selector the mandate for SACA was to produce Test cricket players and nothing else.

"And to play Test cricket you have to play for the state and you have to play for one of the clubs, that's the only pathway.

"I think Alex getting selected might be good for local players who may want to make the commitment and come through club cricket."

Conversely, Beech said Mickan brought an attacking style of football as a coach.


"He gave the playing group and myself a lot of confidence," he said.

Nippy's Gift to celebrate 20th year


ATHLETES will travel from across the country to compete in the 20th running of the Nippy's Loxton Gift Carnival on Saturday, February 27.
