Mis-bee-haviour?

A WELL-known Loxton man is the second Riverland beekeeper to recently claim his bees died due to poisoning by PIRSA.

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"As to the 'extensive investigations', in my case I am very certain PIRSA killed 12 of my hives and damaged 80 more hives.

"They visited the property to take photos six weeks after the deaths and never even contacted the property owner, so I don't call that 'extensive investigation'.

"When it first happened, I feel I was fobbed off on numerous occasions and told a senior manager

would ring me, but they never did.

"(At) the Riverland Field Days, PIRSA asked me to get a bee sample, and then lost it for another five weeks, until it was finally tested and I was told they couldn't find spinosad, so therefore PIRSA was not responsible."

Mr Cass's letter follows similar claims made previously to the Pioneer by Paringa-based apiarist Robert Johnstone.

PIRSA declined to comment further on the matter when contacted by the Pioneer in regard to Mr Cass's claims.

Mr Cass claimed a number of his other hives were also lucky to survive a spraying event by PIRSA in 2024.

"PIRSA operators are very aware where I have 20 beehives at my home property," he says.

"They put in a 'don't spray order', then waited until mid-October 2024 and sprayed right against my fence line, in contravention of their own agreement and far less than the 50m rule.

"When I rang the head office in Loxton this was denied, until I told them I had photos of them

doing this. They then told me it must have been a mistake... fortunately the wind was blowing away from my hives that day, so the bees survived."

Disappointment at mattress madness

THE manager of a Riverland op shop has urged locals to properly dispose of unwanted items, after 10 old mattresses were dumped on their property.

Loxcare Inc, which specialises in giving a second-life to used items, received an unpleasant surprise last week, when someone dumped 10 used mattresses in their shed, located on Pyap Street, at Loxton.

The community hub had to install signage stating "not to dump or leave used mattresses", without ringing the office first and getting an assessment.

Loxcare manager Lynn Hand said "what happened was on Monday night, someone left a bunch of old mattresses in our shed, so we came in the morning and all these were stacked in our property," Ms Hand said.

"There was 10, and we could see from the cameras who it was and how they did it.

"The person moved the portable sign away from his car, turned it around, unloaded the mattresses and put it back again.

"Unfortunately, we had to get rid of them straight away because of environmental health and safety.

"For us to accept mattresses and other items people want to donate, we need to make sure that's suitable and that they haven't got bugs or diseases.

"Mattresses can be between \$30 to \$60 dollars to dispose, so we've had people come up here and leave them on our facilities.

"You can imagine if we got bugs in there, they not only attack mattresses, they also attack our furniture, so we have to clean everything out. The last thing we want is an infestation."

"If a person wants to dispose of a mattress, they can give us a call and we will

send someone to look at it and assess its suitability, whether we can use it or they need to have someone from council collect it and pay the dumping fee," Ms Neale said.

"If we feel that they're suitable and don't pose a health risk, we will pick them up ourselves.

"The best way is to give us a call and ask, there are a lot of things we can put up for sale or donate to other organisations.

"We generally service the Loxton area, but if someone is terminally ill or has to a move in a hurry and they've got a lot of stuff there, we can go and have a look, if we've got room, we will take it"

Ms Hand said Loxcare volunteers are also helping to repurpose donated items.

"We want to provide an efficient service for the community and by repurposing items, we can give back lots of items," Ms Hand said.

"With the new regulations on life jackets, we are getting a bit more stuff from boaties, which we have tried to repurpose, but in the meantime, we are not accepting anymore of those until we can find a solution to where and how we can repurpose those in an ecological way.

"We send stuff to hospitals, mental wards and other organisations that repurpose certain items to be used with their patients and kids.

"We have hundreds of books that come through here too which are helping other

people, or for example we have an elderly knitting group.

"We have a Loxcare group happening where elderly people are knitting stuff but can't afford to buy the implements.

"What we do is talk to them and tell them we are happy to give the items out of our sewing room for them to repurpose and create bags, rugs and other things for us. There is this lady that repurposes old jeans and skirts and creates bags.

"Those items are then sent to hospitals all around the state, and they are used for homeless people or psychiatric wards to help people suffering from dementia."

“To everyone who has helped on the way this is a fantastic legacy you have all done for our community.

“They say it takes a village to bring up a child. It has taken much more to get this facility funded and built.”

Barker MP Tony Pasin said “this facility is a game changer for the community of

Waikerie, adding to the already impressive collection of upgraded sporting facilities across the Riverland”.

“When I first became Barker MP, many sport and recreation facilities across the Riverland required significant investment and modernisation,” Mr Pasin said.

“I’ve worked with Local Government and sporting clubs across the Riverland to change that. The completion of this riverfront Community Hub, at Waikerie, is another piece of that puzzle.

“Sport and recreation facilities are about more than just encouraging active participa-

Fruit fly experts urging Riverlanders to stop fruit sharing

RIVERLAND residents in fruit fly outbreak areas are being urged to refrain from selling or sharing home-grown host fruits and vegetables.

PIRSA incident controller of the fruit fly emergency response Jason Size said this “crucial step is one of the most effective ways to control the spread of fruit fly”.

“For many in the Riverland, sharing home-grown goods with family and friends means a lot to many people – it’s a cherished tradition,” Mr Size said.

“However, to safeguard our community, it’s essential that we

are more cautious during periods of outbreak – so if you want to share it, you’ll need to process it first to ensure that it’s safe.”

Mr Size encouraged residents to access the website (fruitfly.sa.gov.au) for guidance and recipes on safely processing host fruit and vegetables to make them safe to move.

“If your home-grown host fruit and veg are fresh, please don’t sell, share, or donate them if you’re in these affected areas,” he said.

“Our website offers a variety of recipes that allow you to enjoy

and share your home-grown restricted produce safely – and using these recipes to process the food makes it possible to share delicious foods and meals with loved ones without compromising safety.”

Mr Size said ensuring the risk of new outbreaks was minimised needed to be a community priority.

“We’re committed to protecting our horticultural industry and the livelihoods of those who depend on it, which is why we need everyone to follow these guidelines during the outbreak,”

he said.

“It’s safe to move produce if it’s store-bought, as it’s undergone all the necessary treatments – but when it comes to home-grown, it’s something we have to keep at home to reduce the risks.”

In positive news, no new Queensland fruit fly outbreaks have been reported in the Riverland over the past two weeks, keeping the total number of outbreaks stable at 56.

PIRSA will continue to release sterile flies at Lindsay Point, Loxton, Murtho, New Residence, and Pyap, until 23 February.

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Riverland vocational talent awarded

A RIVERLAND electrician and veterinary nurse have been awarded the top honours at the Rotary Club of Berri's 2024 Riverland and Mallee Vocational Awards.

Presented with the honours last Friday night at the Berri Hotel, industrial electrician Michael Grosser received the trophy for Apprentice of the Year, while veterinary nurse Charlotte Zimmermann was named Trainee of the Year.

Set to complete his Certificate III in Electrotechnology in May, Mr Grosser said the prestigious acknowledgement, along with an industry award, was a "great reward after years of hard work".

"It was a bit of a shock, I wasn't expecting it at all," he said.

"It was a great feeling to be with my boss, my family, and my partner and all celebrate together.

"It's very rewarding to be recognised for all the hard work I have put in over the past four years of my apprenticeship — I am very grateful."

Completing his apprenticeship at Loxton business LecLogix Riverland & Mallee for the past four years, Mr Grosser said he was inspired by his dad to choose the trade as his career, with the industry also fulfilling his "need for a challenge".

"I looked to do a trade (initially) because I like learning things by doing them myself," he said.

"As an electrician there is so much to learn and it's constantly challenging.

"I really enjoy being caught off-guard and coming across something new, and then having to work through it and find a solution or get familiar with a new process — I often need to use a lot of problem solving and creative thinking.

"It's always very rewarding when you can solve the problem.

"My father was an industrial electrician, and seeing what he has achieved encouraged me to follow in his footsteps in that sector."

Though taking out the top award, Mr Grosser said he still has "plenty more to learn".

"I will definitely be staying in the Riverland and sticking with LecLogix," he said.

"There is so much room to grow, and I am surrounded by a

group of guys who have a wealth of knowledge which is exponential.

"It would be silly to move — I am in the right place."

Ms Zimmermann said winning Trainee of the Year was a "big accomplishment".

"I was ecstatic the whole night," she said.

"It's a great acknowledgment and reward for the past four years of study."

Though having completed her Certificate IV in Veterinary Nursing last year, Ms Zimmermann has been part of the Riverland Veterinary Practice for almost five years, first entering the clinic for school-based work experience before taking on her training.

"I took on the trade because I really wanted to be hands-on, and being able to put theory into practice has been very beneficial.

"I have always loved and wanted to take care of animals ever since I was a little girl, and now I can.

"It has been a great way for me to learn, upskill, and become the best nurse I can be — it's very fulfilling."

With major highlights including accompanying her employer to Coober Pedy, in which she worked with limited resources and space while providing care to both large and small animals, Ms Zimmermann said her vocational training had "been some

of her best years".

"All of these opportunities and experiences have also helped me develop as a person with my confidence and the way I can now provide care to clients and patients," she said.

"Having such great support from the practice and my family has also been amazing."

Planning to stay at the Riverland Veterinary Clinic and continue to help the community with her skills, Ms Zimmermann said hopes to continue to study in industry areas such as anaesthetics or physiotherapy.

"I want to keep learning and continue to improve on my skills," she said.

Rotary Club of Berri president Bruce Richardson said the 2024 celebrations were "another excellent night" of the Vocational Awards.

"It's always a great opportunity to hear about what the finalists have been doing with their lives and their careers," Mr Richardson said.

"The longevity of the event is a testament to the enthusiasm and standard quality of the young people we have in the Riverland and training in the local area.

"Congratulations from the rotary club to the winners and a big thank you to everyone who supports our project each year."

Unwanted side effects?

A LETTER to the editor written by Loxton man Ian Cass – inside today's edition of The Murray Pioneer – adds an intriguing new chapter to the story surrounding PIRSA, Naturalure, and the deaths of bees.

Those Pioneer readers who have been following the previous claims made by Paringa-based beekeeper Robert Johnstone might be forgiven for thinking those may have been a lone man with a grudge seeking to point fingers – and direct blame – for what could have been the accidental death of his bees.

However, the addition of details now provided by Mr Cass may begin to sway people's perspectives.

While Mr Cass's letter raises a number of quite poignant questions, PIRSA's decision to avoid responding directly to the letter might raise some that are even bigger.

Considering the size of the Riverland region, the communication necessary between staff in the region and in Adelaide, and the number of properties to be inspected on a regular basis, how truly co-ordinated can the eradication effort be?

Those with a critical mind could probably find numerous instances where the organisation of those working in the public sphere has been less than optimal.

It is important to once again note that Mr Cass – similarly to Robbie Johnstone – is not seeking to blame any particular individual involved in the Riverland Fruit Fly response program, and understanding the economic impact that has impacted our communities since 2020, both are entirely supportive of the ongoing effort to eradicate the pest from the region.

This positive ongoing impact of our local eradication measures can be seen in yesterday's announcement that the Riverland had been without any new fruit fly outbreaks for the past fortnight.

While many in the community would have seen dozens of these announcements made since 2020, each fortnight the region can go without recording new outbreaks is further evidence the final goal of eradication is possible.

It is a battle that cannot be given up on, however, both Mr Cass and Mr Johnstone have seen their own livelihoods economically impacted due to the deaths of thousands of their bees, and would also say they are seeking nothing more than what, in their eyes, would be considered as just compensation.

This leaves several key points that need to be considered. Does there need to be further evaluation on the effects of bees interacting with Naturalure? Does PIRSA need to investigate more stringent conditions around where they spray?

Hopefully a satisfactory outcome can be reached without any further deaths to bees, accidental or not.



He served well. Though born into farm life with fences all round, Don Woon was not fenced-in through his life's activities and achievements. Growing up in Pyap West, an isolated but active Northern Mallee community, he was diligent and astute in serving local agencies and sporting clubs. Don attended Adelaide High School and Roseworthy Ag College. With the outbreak of WWII, he enlisted and served in RAF No. 15 Squadron as wireless operator in Lancaster bombers that operated from Mildenhall, England. From there he completed a tour of 31 challenging operations. At war's-end he returned to farm at Pyap West. He was an elected member of Loxton District Council from 1960 to 1970, president Pata/Loxton sub-branch of the Wheat and Woolgrowers Association, and zone president in 1970; and Pata Water Scheme chairman. Don was much involved in the Loxton RSL Sub-branch and in Legacy, but not as heavily as was he in cricket administration. He was for a time president of the Loxton RSL Sub-branch and president and secretary of Legacy Riverland. In 1983, Don and wife Eileen moved from farming at Pyap West to a career with MLC Insurance. For some time after Eileen's death in 2009, Don continued in Loxton until moving to Adelaide nearer to their three daughters. Don died in 2013, aged 89, leaving a legacy of progress and development. Reply to no conclusive evidence

PIRSA STATES there is "no conclusive evidence" bee poisoning (Murray Pioneer, 5/2/25) yet in 2020, PIRSA paid two beekeepers compensation for the loss of beehives after they were poisoned by PIRSA.

Plus we have the documentation from PIRSA itself, including the payment details.

In the Pioneer article, PIRSA states after extensive investigations it has found no evidence, and in reply the public need to know that the chemical spinosad, which is the active ingredient in Naturalure – the main chemical being used by PIRSA – has a very short half-life.

And we have been told that it isn't able to be detected in bee samples as it simply degrades before the sample can be tested.

This does not mean it was not the killer, it simply means it is almost impossible to prove that PIRSA was responsible.

I would point out in every case of extreme bee deaths in the Riverland area in the last couple of years that I believe one common denominator was present: PIRSA operators spraying Naturalure.

Let us look at the chemical spinosad, which PIRSA points out is organic and safe.

I would like to point out in reply to that statement that snake venom is organic, and spinosad is about as lethal to bees as a human getting a brown snake bite.

As to the extensive investigations, in my case I am very certain PIRSA killed 12 of my hives and damaged 80 more hives. They visited the property to take photos six weeks after the deaths and never even contacted the property owner. So, I don't call that 'extensive investigation'.

When it first happened, I feel I was fobbed off on numerous occasions and was told a senior manager would ring me, but they never did.

After being what I feel was confronted at the Riverland Field Days, PIRSA asked me to get a bee sample, and then lost it for

another five weeks, until it was finally tested and I was told they couldn't find spinosad, so therefore PIRSA was not responsible.

I was never even given a copy of the lab report and have been since told by PIRSA that it could have been anything that killed my bees. I asked "what do they suggest, as I have never had any other bee deaths like that?"

They shrugged their shoulders.

PIRSA states they do everything according to the label. In July 2023, in my case, PIRSA sprayed black box trees covered in flowers, which my bees were working at the time, on the river flats, at Gurra, after the 2022 flood. This is a complete disregard to the label.

PIRSA has stated to beekeepers that 50m is a completely safe distance to spray a lethal insecticide away from beehives, yet the label states to be careful of drift and despite PIRSA saying this is safe, I don't know of a farmer or blockie who would say 50m is a safe distance to use a lethal chemical in very windy conditions.

I have personally seen PIRSA operators using Naturalure in very windy conditions, yet in my view they don't care as it isn't their back pockets hurt by the damage of this very dangerous insecticide. Their operators are told how safe this chemical is.

PIRSA operators are very aware where I have 20 beehives at my home property. They put in a 'don't spray order', then waited until mid-October 2024 and sprayed right against my fence line, in contravention of their own agreement and far less than the 50m rule.

When I rang the head office in Loxton this was denied, until I told them I had photos of them doing this. They then told me it must have been a mistake. I am the one who loses if they make a mistake, but fortunately the wind was blowing away from my hives that day, so the bees survived.

I believe this program has had complaints by numerous beekeepers, and several homes who have lost a dog, guinea pigs and poultry.

Yet every time, guess what? It wasn't PIRSA.

I question their statement at the start of "no conclusive proof" of bee poisoning. I think this is very conclusive.

Say it ain't so, Albo

HAVING been a qualified electronics technician for over 50 years, I could not help but follow what I think is the ongoing farce imposed upon the Australian people by the incumbent federal government, on the advice of their relevant, so-called expert telcos.

Australia is one of the first countries to shut down both 2G and 3G mobile services – others have not done it yet for good reasons.

Numerous devices rely on either 2G or 3G. Most countries that have shut down 3G have at least kept 2G (GSM) as a back-up. The few exceptions are Singapore (since the end of 2021), and most carriers in the USA no longer have 2G or 3G networks.

Virtually all other countries retain one or the other, for now. Some have discussed shutting them down in future, but most don't have a specific date yet. One exception is Japan, where major carriers plan to end 3G service by March 2026.

Another reason to keep one or the other is that 4G coverage is generally not as good in remote areas, so it's good to have 2G/3G to fall back on if you're in an area with poor 4G coverage – something that would seem to be smart in a large country like Australia, with people living in remote areas.

However, I guess our politicians are smarter than their peers overseas and can get away with doing this without consequences – yeah right.

Remember NBN, who removed landlines and forced many people to switch to 3G for services like back-to-base house alarms, asset tracking and so on. That was before 4G, so people who were forced to replace those devices about 10 years ago are being, or have been, forced to

replace them yet again,

That's not all. 4G is not really a proper standard and many phones implement it (VoLTE) differently. That means that some 4G/5G phones fall back on 3G to make emergency calls.

Without a 3G network, they are therefore unable to call 000.

It gets worse. This government's 'solution' is to force all the carriers to block all phones from their network if they can't be 100 per cent sure they are able to call 000 without the 3G networks. This has resulted in many phones being blocked that do support 4G and can call 000, simply because it's so difficult to create a comprehensive list of all supported devices.

It is my understanding some of these blocked devices are relatively new 5G smartphones. The phrase 'an absolute chaos' is probably the best way to describe this incredible conundrum. Over 500,000 active devices have been blocked from our networks due to this debacle, most of which are now basically e-waste.

Possibly in excess of 1 million devices are affected, and that's ignoring those that have already been replaced due to the then approaching 3G shutdown. Discarding many millions of otherwise functional devices can't be good for the environment, something I think our government pretends to care about.

It's also a big waste of money. Some of these devices cost upwards of \$1000, and were perfectly functional before they were made redundant. Some, like the 3G devices integrated into some vehicles, have no obvious upgrade path.

A cynical person could say that the telcos must have lobbied for this situation, because it now means that they essentially have a monopoly on selling mobile devices in Australia. After all, not only can they block 'grey market' phones, they are legally required to do so.

How long will these 4G-enabled phones be useful?

Will the 4G network be switched off in the near future, forcing us to replace them all again? It would not surprise me

at all, because not more than a handful of years after I completed my apprenticeship, protection for our local industries in Australia collapsed courtesy – or otherwise – of tariffs removed, or severely reduced on imported products, such as motor vehicles and electronics. As a result, technical training in Australia, for Australians, was cut back.

Factories began closing down, or being relocated overseas with cheap labour, and their government incentives such as cheap land, electricity, gas and water. Meanwhile, Australians mostly lost their jobs and swelled the dole queues.

I think unions have a lot to answer for.

Australians are now increasingly reliant on foreign expertise in an increasingly technological world.

Therefore, along with overseas technology, restrictions to our knowledge base, and incurring in-confidence clauses, we have less and less local expertise to instigate services, or even to understand what the hell is happening in this country, with the wonderful euphemism called ‘communication progress’.

South Australian child protection data spirals

As the family and domestic violence epidemic persists across Australia, the safety and wellbeing of children is going backwards in such states as South Australia and Victoria.

Crucial data released by the Productivity Commission shows rates of children entering residential care – the least desirable form of care – in SA is heading in the wrong direction at alarming speeds.

The number of children in long-term (two years or more) out-of-home care is up by 5 per cent - some 3435 children.

The total number of children in out-of-home care in SA continues to rise and more than half are under 12.

Data also released by the South Australian Department for Child Protection confirms residential care has increased 11 per cent, and foster care has risen by

5 per cent. The increase in residential care in SA is particularly troubling. Family violence, as well as substance misuse are key drivers for children entering child protection and SA remains behind in its progress on delivering frontline workers for SA, and needs to come clean on how the Far West Coast and APY Lands and poor service delivery are contributing to these numbers.

Doubling down on regional specialists

AUSTRALIA'S medical colleges are backing their commitment to regional healthcare with concrete action, launching an unprecedented expansion of specialist training in regional, rural, and remote areas.

This expansion reflects a coordinated effort across all medical colleges to address the critical shortage of specialists outside major cities.

Our rural and regional communities deserve the same access to specialist care as our cities.

We're seeing real results from our colleges' commitment to rural training.

The Royal Australian College of General Practitioners has filled all rural training positions for 2025. New data shows that 585 GPs will begin rural spe-

cialist training in 2025, part of a broader intake of 1,506 junior doctors into specialist programs – a 20 per cent increase from last year.

The Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine reports 80 per cent of their graduates now practice in rural areas.

In partnership with the Northern Territory Government, the Royal Australasian College of Surgeons (RACS) has commenced its first-ever dedicated general surgery training pathway, designed to train surgeons within and for the Territory's unique healthcare needs.

The Australian and New Zealand College of Anaesthetists has awarded 343 rural generalist certificates as part of their comprehensive regional workforce strategy.

Several colleges, including those for ophthalmologists and medical administrators, now mandate rural placements lasting six to 12 months.

The expansion comes as projections show Australia could face a shortage of 5000 doctors by 2030. While overseas-trained specialists help fill immediate gaps, medical colleges are prioritising sustainable solutions through local training programs.

We're building lasting change by training specialists who understand regional communities and are more likely to stay long-term.



AFTER her arrival at Loxton, one of the Riverland's most iconic river boats is set to open its doors for locals and tourists seeking new accommodation options.

Murray River Queen (MRQ) owner – and Loxton local – Donna Neale said the opening of accommodation facilities was set for this weekend.

“The rooms are all being partially or fully renovated because we want to do things right,” Ms Neale said.

River recovery efforts continue

THE Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB) has been granted almost \$1m to support efforts to stop the local flow and growth of pests and weeds post-2022-23 flood.

The MRLB River to Recovery Program has been granted \$998,733, from a \$4.76m State Government initiative to aid a number of landscape projects across the region as part of the 2024-25 round of the Landscape Priorities Fund.

“Our state's landscape boards are often the organisations which can make impactful on-ground changes across both public and private land in their regions,” Minister for Climate, Environment and Water Susan Close said.

“These funds help the

boards to undertake projects that could otherwise be beyond their usual resourcing.

“All of the work that is funded through this program is vital for helping to protect our precious natural environment and biodiversity.”

Stopping the increase of post-2022-23 flood pests in the area MRLB sustainable landscapes manager Renata Rix said the funding is an investment to “do extra work the board are not normally able to complete”.

“The funding has allowed extra capacity and dollars to do pest control work across flood-affected areas,” Ms Rix said.

“The floods pushed a lot of weed seed into areas further afield than normal, while also giving everything a good drink.

“The proliferation of

weeds has led to an increase of rabbits, which also eat native growth (that) has thrived post-flood.

“The main goal of this project is to help the community get on top of weed control and pest issues for their relevant land usage — be that recreational, environmental, or industry — as well as capitalising on the environmental positives that did come from the flood, such as the regeneration of native plants.

“Local government has been under the pump with post-flood impacts to their budget, having to account for a lot of infrastructure repair.

“Pests are always a priority for us, so it's great to be able to manage this issue for the community — if left unmanaged, we would lose the benefit of the flood.”

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Pasin not convinced by banking agreement

FURTHER support measures are needed to ensure further closures to Riverland bank branches are avoided, according to the region's Federal MP.

The Federal Government last week announced an agreement with banks to "ensure banking services remain available in the regions".

Barker MP Tony Pasin said sustaining local bank branches was crucial for regional communities.

"Face-to-face banking services add to the vibrancy of regional towns," Mr Pasin said.

"The decision to close branches is extremely disappointing not only for customers, but for the whole community who feel a sense of abandonment when banks pack up and leave town.

"In a period of record profitability for the Australian banking sector, the decision to withdraw services from regional Australia is unconsumable. The (Commonwealth Bank of Australia) has just reported a half-year cash profit well above expectations... but the Labor Government thinks they can fix the issue of regional banking closures by shifting banking services onto Australia Post licenced post offices.

"I don't have a problem with this model where there is no other option, so long as the banks are paying a reasonable rates per transaction.

"However, in regional centres where branches are still required by the community, I believe banks should be reinvesting some of these record profits to maintaining region-

al bank branches, employing locals delivering face-to-face service."

Federal Government data shows 36 per cent of bank branches in regional Australia have closed since 2017.

A statement on the matter said the Federal Government was "standing up for regional Australians, helping to secure the banking services they need and deserve".

"More than banking, this is about keeping regional communities, that contribute so much to our national economy, connected and thriving," the statement read.

"People are increasingly using digital banking and payment methods, but face-to-face services remain essential, particularly for people and small businesses in regional areas, where digital alternatives may not always be accessible or meet their needs."

The package of commitments from the banks includes:

- ❑ A moratorium on branch closures for two-and-a-half years: NAB has committed to a new moratorium on regional branch closures, with CBA and Westpac extending their existing moratoriums. These commitments build on the conditions imposed by the government on ANZ and Suncorp and ensure no regional branch closures by these banks before 31 July 2027.
- ❑ New Bank@Post agreements: The government has asked the banking sector to increase its commitment to, and investment in, regional banking.

Pasin hears Riverland concerns

RIVERLANDERS met with the region's Federal MP last weekend to discuss difficulties surrounding the cost of living, and the ongoing sustainability of local primary production.

Barker MP Tony Pasin last Saturday held a listening post ses-

sion at Renmark Central Plaza.

Mr Pasin said issues raised by locals focused on the current cost-of-living crisis, and uncertainty regarding water policies.

"We've had people raising issues surrounding mobile phone reception, and the state of the road network, with a lot of people raising issues generally, and more spe-

cifically," Mr Pasin said.

"There was an issue (raised) around it being more and more difficult to own and rent property. One lady was very concerned about the attitude where government makes really strict rules regarding what a landlord can, or can't do.

"A number of people were con-

cerned about the cost-of-living, and about housing prices.

"Invariably in the Riverland we have concerns around water licencing, and the future of the Murray-Darling Basin... there are always interesting ideas about how to manage the challenges surrounding water licencing."

Mr Pasin said voicing the con-

cerns of Riverland communities at the Federal Government level was an ongoing priority.

"I value the views of people who live in the electorate," he said.

"I make a huge effort to be available at shows, field days, and community events. Listening posts are just another part of that architecture."

Still waiting for safety?

IN 2021, the former coalition government committed to funding the first step of the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass.

Under the former state Liberal and Coalition Government South Australia was put on a trajectory to improve productivity and safety by building the Truro freight route, while a number of strategic planning and business cases got underway towards developing a high-productivity freight network.

Since 2022, those opposite have cut, cancelled or delayed almost \$30bn in infrastructure funding, including funding for the critical Truro freight route, just months before shovels were set to hit the ground.

For my community in Barker, the Truro freight route is incredibly important. It's important for safety along the Sturt Highway

corridor and instrumental in working towards the duplication of the Sturt Highway, which carries vehicles between New South Wales and Adelaide, or further west to Perth. This work at Truro is also vital for plans to get heavy vehicles off the South Eastern Freeway and out of the suburbs of Adelaide.

If we want to grow this nation's economy, improve productivity and safety on our freight routes, and address the road safety crisis that is unfolding under Labor, we need those opposite to stop playing politics with roads. Those opposite have wasted a full term in government with no plans for South Australia's wider freight network.

All I've seen from those opposite over two-and-a-half years is putting votes in front of road safety and road investment decisions.

One Nation candidate visiting Riverland

Restoring balance to the Murray-Darling Basin Plan and delivering tax and cost-of-living relief will be the focus of a visit to the Riverland by One Nation's lead Senate candidate for South Australia, Jennifer Game.

Ms Game, who has been a senior adviser to Senator Pauline Hanson for eight years, will meet with key stakeholders in the Riverland this weekend as well as speak at events for the public.

"One Nation is taking a suite of policies to the Federal election aimed at putting more money in Australians' pockets," she said.

"We'll slash government waste, pay down Federal debt and invest in Australia's future.

"I'm also keen to meet with local irrigators and processors during the weekend and talk about One Nation's policy to restore balance to the Basin Plan.

"Senator Pauline Hanson chose the Riverland as the place to announce our water policy last year. This is because Riverland irrigators are the best in the Basin when it comes to water efficiency.

"Our policy is to reintroduce the 1500GL cap on buybacks, restore the socio-economic test for the additional 450GL, and reduce the northern Basin recovery target back to 320GL. Riverland irrigators have given up almost a third of their productive water to the Basin Plan since 2009. Enough is enough. Riverland growers should not have to give up another drop of water.

"Riverland water efficiency comes at a cost of high electricity costs. One Nation's policy to slash electricity bills by 20 per cent – by changing National Electricity Market (NEM) rules to favour lower-cost generation like gas and coal – should have a significant downward effect on the costs

borne by Riverland irrigators."

Ms Game said One Nation's signature election policy would slash \$90bn from wasteful government spending, put \$40bn more in Australians' pockets, pay down Federal government debt and invest in nation-building infrastructure to help Australia secure the economic opportunities of the 21st century.

"We'll abolish the Department of Climate Change and related agencies and programs, audit indigenous spending and abolish the National Indigenous Australians Agency, cut foreign aid and withdraw Australia's participation in useless international organisations like the International Criminal Court, World Health Organisation and the United Nations," she said.

"Our plan is about reducing the cost of living. We're abolishing the excise on alcohol served at hospitality venues, and freezing indexation on all alcohol. We're halving the fuel excise to 26 cents per litre, providing relief for motorists and at the supermarket.

"We will allow couples with dependent children to split incomes and file joint tax returns – saving thousands of dollars in tax. We'll let aged and veteran pensioners earn as much as they want without their pension being affected.

"We will also crack down on fraud and boost Medicare funding to improve bulk-billing rates and help prevent the exodus of GPs from the system.

"I'll be talking about these and other policies that One Nation has released in recent weeks, but I'm looking forward to visiting the Riverland primarily to meet people and talk about the issues which matter to them."

Ms Game will appear at the Barmera Golf Club, on Friday, from 6pm, and at Bassham Wines, on Sunday, from 11.30am.

Concept planning for Loxton and Waikerie pool upgrades

TWO Riverland community assets need vital infrastructure upgrades in order to meet current compliance standards aiming to provide local users with state-of-the-art facilities.

The District Council of Loxton Waikerie has launched a concept planning and design project to guide the potential redevelopment and upgrades of the Loxton and Waikerie community pools.

Council appointed two consultants, DesignInc and insideEDGE Sport and Leisure Planning, to work with the local community in developing of future revitalisation plans.

The project will aim to create a close collaboration between the consultants, the council, and the community to explore different options to enhance the pool complexes.

Loxton Waikerie Council Mayor Trevor Norton said "our 2024-25 community engagement indicated that

swimming pool upgrades were the community's number-one priority for projects in the coming financial years".

"We are excited to take the next step in making these much-needed upgrades a reality and are eager to hear from the community to ensure we deliver pool facilities that truly meet everyone's needs," Mr Norton said.

Prior to developing concept plans, council invited the local community through one of two surveys, specific to each pool, allowing current pool users and non-users to provide input on the future direction of the pools, including suggestions for potential upgrades and improvements.

The feedback plays a key role in shaping the final concept plans, with the consultation period to conclude at 5pm, on Monday 10 March.

Updated evacuation plans and smoke alarms and can save your life

SUMMER fires are a risk for several regions across the state, including the Riverland, and protecting homes and nearby areas has to be a priority for everyone, according to a safety expert.

In just two to three minutes, a small fire can engulf a room, leaving little time to escape, yet nearly half (49 per cent) of Australian homes impacted by fires in 2024, either had no working smoke alarms or none installed.

Brooks Australia SA/NT specifications manager Bec Golding spoke about the importance of self-evacuation plans and the correct installation and usage of smoke alarms.

"Remote and rural communities face unique challenges due to their geographic isolation and this often makes it harder for emergency services to respond quickly," Ms Golding said.

"Fire seasons are on the horizon, which means bushfire risks could escalate, and being proactive now can save lives later.

"Residents must be proactive in understanding the steps they need to take to protect themselves and their families, as quick action is critical and every minute counts.

"We know that regional Australians have faced significant challenges at the start of the year with bushfires and other natural disasters, but it's critical to stay vigilant as these risks don't diminish quickly."

Ms Golding said correctly installed smoke alarms can provide an important level of protection for residents in regional areas.

"Smoke alarms help emergency services locate people in danger, and this is especially important in rural and regional areas where help can be far away," she said.

"Nearly half of Australian homes impacted by fires during 2024 had no working smoke alarms or none at all."

Residents in areas which are prone to fires during summer can be prepared and take small actions when a fire occurs.

The dangers exist beyond house fires, with smoke alarms still playing a critical role in bushfire emergencies, helping emer-

gency services locate and evacuate people in danger and assist in containing fires by providing early alerts.

While firefighters are invaluable in protecting communities during natural disasters, emergency services often need to travel considerable distances to respond to house fires in rural and regional areas.

"There are a few precautions people can take," Ms Golding said.

- These include:
- Regularly reviewing and updating your emergency plan or escape plan.
 - Staying informed with local fire danger ratings and keeping track of current conditions.
 - Keeping your home clear of fire hazards, including dry vegetation, debris, and flammable materials.
 - Testing your smoke alarm monthly to ensure it's working, as this is your first line of alert in dangerous situations.
 - If a fire is reported, immediately follow your emergency plan and evacuate if necessary.
 - Staying connected to emergency services for up-to-date alerts and instructions, and then making sure your family members are accounted for and safe.
 - Assist anyone who may need help evacuating and if you're unable to evacuate, find a safe shelter and call emergency services.

Warning to avoid increasing romance scams

RIVERLANDERS seeking romance online and through social media have been warned to look out for scammers seeking financial gain.

Romance scams are very common these days, with scammers trying to influence their targets with love and affection and often coming up with elaborate stories about why they need money urgently, with the majority of victims contacted via social media.

Following last Friday's Valentine's Day, the State Government statistics show more than \$1.7m was lost to romance scams in 176 reports made to Scamwatch from South Australians, however, many of these scams are often underreported.

Scammers may also convince people to take out money for a fake investment, often claiming it's in cryptocurrency.

Minister for Consumer and Business Affairs Andrea Michaels said "looking for love online can make you vulnerable and unfortunately, this is what scammers look for as they seek to gain your trust".

"Take things slowly when you meet new people online," Ms Michaels said.

"Ask lots of questions and watch for things that don't add up."

"If they ask you for money, you should stop contact straight away and get support.

"Never send money, card or bank details, personal information or identity documents to someone you only know online, no matter how long you've been messaging."

Practical steps people can take to protect themselves include:

- Do a reverse-image search on Google or TinEye. This can help determine if their profile image is legitimate.
- Arrange to meet in person in a safe place, or ask to speak via video. If they can't, it's a warning sign.
- Watch out for any request to send them money through methods such as money order, wire transfer, international funds transfer, pre-loaded cards, or electronic currency, like bitcoin.
- If you are the victim of a scam, it is difficult to recover money sent through these methods.
- If you think you have been scammed, contact your bank or financial institution as soon as possible.

New AED grants program open for applications

This new round of the Automated External Defibrillators (AED) Grants Program is providing grants to assist eligible not-for-

profit community and sporting organisations with the cost of purchasing AEDs and meeting the requirements of the Automated External Defibrillators (Public Access) Act 2022 (the Act).

LGA hosted a webinar on defibrillator legislation and grant opportunities on 17 February, where questions regarding the necessary requirements to apply

for the state funding and the funding available were answered.

Councils who have already applied for the last grant round are eligible to apply again for other buildings, with applications closing 30 April.

"Today is a significant day for our aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities, as well as the wider Riverland community," organiser Sam Mitchell said.

"Moments like this create awareness and understanding about Apology Day, as well as the impact of past government policies on

our communities."

Hosting an Apology Day commemoration in the Riverland for the past six years, Mr Mitchell said each year "has gotten a bigger and better response" from the local community.

"The attendance grows each year," he said.

"We always try to add something to the (commemoration) each year as well.

"This year we had the student's light candles for the Stolen Generations.

"I hope it will just continue to grow."

Visiting Riverland schools this past month to provide educational sessions prior to Apology Day, Mr Mitchell said sharing the history of the Stolen Generations with local students makes him feel "like (he) is making a real difference".

"Having the opportunity to be welcomed into the schools, and provide those sessions was great," he said.

"Sometimes we can get difficult responses from adults, not understanding the need for the apology, but the kids always respond so well, and with such empathy.

"I hope making these connections and sharing the history can provide an understanding that will spread throughout the community."

educated in London. After graduating he worked in private industry at Case International Agriculture Equipment UK.



Travel vaccinations now at local pharmacies

RIVERLANDERS heading overseas can now have trained community pharmacists assess them with vaccination requirements based on their destination and administer recommended vaccinations for preventable diseases such as hepatitis A and B and typhoid.



Travellers heading overseas can now receive their travel vaccinations at a local pharmacy through new regulations introduced by the State Government, under the pharmacy travel vaccination service, which complements other services already available through health providers.

The recent changes follow an extensive consultation process and further expand the scope of practice for community pharmacists, who can already administer a range of vaccines without a prescription.

Minister for Health and Wellbeing Chris Picton said “every South Australian should be able to access the treatment they need, when they need it, which is why expanding our state’s access-

sibility to health care is so important”.

“By further expanding pharmacists’ scope of practice, we are empowering our highly trained pharmacists to vaccinate even more South Australians to provide increased protection against preventable disease,” Mr Picton said.

“Pharmacies are the ideal location to provide travel vaccination services, as they are well distributed across South Australia, including in regional areas, and many are open for extended hours or operate seven days a week.”

Travellers are encouraged to access their travel vaccinations six-to-12 weeks before they leave Australia, to ensure they have time to develop full immunity, with some vaccines requiring several doses to achieve the necessary protection.

Anyone intending to use the new service can call their local pharmacy or check online to locate a participating site and book in.

There are also certain requirements for vaccines such as Yellow Fever, so it is recommended to speak to a GP or pharmacist for more information.

SA family cost-of-living relief

THE State Government is expanding support measures to address the cost of living for Riverland families as children return to school.

As more than 193,000 South Australia children head into classrooms across the state last month, Premier Peter Malinauskas outlined targeted assistance available to manage the pressures of the cost of living for families.

All families with children at public schools and who are required to pay the materials and services charge will benefit from a discount of \$200 per child in 2025.

The prescribed component of the annual materials and services charge, which covers the cost of essential items and services used or consumed by a student for the school year, is this year set at \$300 for each primary student, and \$396 for each secondary student.

Students from reception to year 9 are also now eligible to receive double the support through two \$100 Sports Vouchers per calendar year. For the first time, music lessons and active recreation will also be incorporated.

Applications are now open for low-income families who qualify for a School Card – and this year the threshold has increased by 4.5 per cent.

A family with a combined gross income of lower than \$74,189 can qualify for the School Card, which means they will be unrequired to pay a materials and services charge, and can also qualify for help with expenses such as uniforms, camp and excursion costs.

If families are not eligible for the School Card, they should reach out to their school, which can help with assistance such as payment options and plans.

Additionally, families will be provided with assistance through a series of pilot programs, financial rebates and targeted support during the 2025 school year.

More than 340 schools across the state have registered to participate in the School Device program.

Families on School Card, with students in years 7 and 10 attending one of the participating schools, will receive free devices to support their studies.

There are also bulk purchasing discounts for other families.

Families without reliable home internet can also request free internet from the department at any time throughout the school year.

In Terms 1 and 2 the Department for Education is running a trial program for funding to be provided to year 7 country school card students to support their attendance on school camps and excursions.

Hundreds of schools will also be providing breakfast programs for students in need.

While each school decides about using a breakfast program, and how often, there has been an increase in the number of days of operation, with 71 per cent of sites that run a breakfast program offering these five days per week in 2024, compared to 56 per cent at the end of 2023.

“A good education is the key to every child’s future, regardless of their ability or circumstances,” Mr Malinauskas said.

“The assistance we’re providing across a range of programs will hopefully make it easier for families with school-age children.

“Back to school can sometimes be a difficult time for families, with parents juggling a range of expenses to prepare their children for the new school year.

“These measures provide a practical way to give parents some relief from some of those financial pressures.”







Mid Murray gets \$1.5m tourism funding guernsey

A GRANT of more than \$1.5m is set to support Mid Murray Council in increasing the area's tourism, and planning strategies for future economic growth.

Mid Murray Council last week announced it had received \$1.52m through the Federal Government's Regional Precincts and Partnerships Program, for initiatives that will further support additional tourism growth in the district and to develop regional masterplans.

Mid Murray Mayor Simone Bailey said the funding was a substantial investment in the district's future.

"These grants are a significant contribution towards... expanding tourism opportunities right across the Mid Murray," Ms Bailey said.

"Mid Murray is still recovering from the impacts of the 2022/23 River Murray Flood and this grant funding will go a long way towards promoting tourism assets and facilities in our river communities, and the region more broadly.

"From the natural beauty of the Murray and all it offers in terms of water sports, heritage cruising and laid-back holidays, to the rich First Nations history of the Ngaut Ngaut Conservation Park, and the unparalleled beauty of the night sky in our International Dark Sky Reserve – there is something for everyone in our area.

"We believe that the Mid Murray has significant potential for tourism growth, and the projects supported by this grant will help us realise some of these incredible opportunities. The council appreciates and acknowledges the Albanese Government's continued support for the region."

It is understood the funding will cover an Indigenous heritage survey, plan-

ning and design of tourism infrastructure for Australia's only International Dark Sky Reserve, and the creation of regional masterplans for 11 towns across the Mid Murray.

Ms Bailey said the supporting growth to the region's economy and developing a strategic process for tourism asset construction was a goal.

"We're going to have a live band on the night, and some guest speakers right at the start of the night, with a couple of big surprises too."


"All we ask for is people talking about the foundation and getting the awareness around it in the area, and that helps as well."

Hard work brings wins for Mid Murray Council

There's a real sense of positivity in the air right now, and with good reason.

Last month, I received a call from a federal minister to share some incredible news, our council had secured \$1.52m in funding through the Federal Government's Regional Precincts and Partnership Program.

This follows December's \$1.1m Play Our Way funding announcement, and

the \$18m drought support package from the State Government the month before.

Each of these funding wins was personally communicated to me by a minister, a testament to the growing recognition of our community's needs at the highest levels of government.

These milestones didn't happen by chance.

They are the result of relentless advocacy, effective storytelling, and a deep commitment to regional equity, driven by the hard work of council staff, elected

members, community partnerships and the passionate voices of our community.

Back in May 2024, I wrote about the inequities regional communities face, urging our residents to stand with us in making our voices heard.

In our case, advocacy isn't just about identifying problems, it's about offering solutions and ensuring those in decision-making roles understand the unique pressures on regional councils.

For too long, regional areas have had to fight for the same level of support

that metropolitan communities often receive with ease.

Our recent successes demonstrate that when we tell our story in a way that resonates, people listen.

When I campaigned for mayor in October 2022, I was told in a public forum that I wasn't particularly skilled at networking.

I took that as a challenge. Since then, I've worked tirelessly to build relationships, create opportunities, and ensure our community's voice is not only heard, but felt.

The reality is, Mid Murray sits in very safe political seats. That could have been a barrier to securing funding. Instead, our approach has proven that advocacy isn't just about politics or votes, it's about making our case in a way that decision-makers can't ignore.

These funding wins are a direct investment in our community's future.

They mean better facilities, stronger support for local families and businesses, and greater resilience in the face of challenges like drought and economic uncertainty.

But beyond the dollar amounts, they represent something even more valuable, recognition that regional communities matter.

This is just the beginning. I am committed to continuing this fight for regional equity because I know how much is at stake.

Progress doesn't happen overnight, but every meeting, every conversation, and every challenge along the way has led to real, tangible outcomes for our community.

While advocacy can sometimes feel like an uphill battle, these recent wins prove that when we persist, we succeed.

But the work isn't done. Regional areas deserve fairness, investment, and oppor-

tunity, and we must continue making our voices heard.

One of my top advocacy priorities remains the equitable distribution of Financial Assistance Grants, ensuring regional councils receive their fair share of funding to meet the needs of their communities.

Together, we can build on this momentum and ensure even greater outcomes for all regional areas.

Headings Cliff offers stunning views of the Murray River and is one of the most-photographed scenes in the region. The bridge is of particular structural significance due to its advanced engineering, which allows a section of the bridge to be raised to allow larger river traffic to pass through. The bridge structure was designed and constructed in Adelaide and was to cater for both road and rail traffic.

The Renmark Paringa Community Museum is an outdoor museum featuring a vast range of farm equipment and agricultural implements in a riverside setting. Set in a landscaped native garden on the banks of the Murray River alongside the historic Paringa Bridge, the museum features a range of vintage farm machinery, implements, sheds, tools and static displays. Their collection of historical steam engines, many in working order, is impressive. A recent addition to the museum is the Black Stump, which is one of the largest of 11 known black stumps in Australia.

Paringa Silo Art

The Paringa Silo Art stands tall and proud, offering a glimpse into the areas past, selected historical figures and relaxed lifestyle on the Murray River. There are four distinct images (two on the front facing the Sturt Highway, and two on the rear of the structure) linked together with soaring pelicans. Local characters were selected to feature as the base silhouettes with the story of our district told through the images within the profiles, including Possum, and his mythologi-

cal connection with the Murray River, a houseboat, the historic Paddle Steamer Industry, a dinghy, the magnificent river cliffs plus the iconic Paringa Bridge and a Murray cod.

Amy's skills key to landscape board success

AT the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board they believe that science needs more passionate, driven women – and Amy is a perfect example of why.

Starting her studies in marine biology at the height of the pandemic, fieldwork opportunities were scarce. Determined to gain hands-on experience, she pursued an honours degree in ecology and evolutionary biology, diving into how habitat type and marine protection status alter the behaviour of range-extending tropical fish in temperate ecosystems. Her fieldwork took her along Australia's stunning eastern coastline, where she explored diverse marine landscapes.

In June 2024, she joined the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board as a casual employee in the citizen science team, getting hands-on with projects like frog monitoring, Soil Your Undies, National Science Week events and much more. Her experience showed her the power of community-driven science in conservation.

Amy also learned about the work of the wetlands team, getting involved in bird and fish surveys, surface water surveys, and threatened species projects. She found herself exactly where she wanted to be out in the field, making a real impact.

Now, as a proud member of the wetlands team, Amy is excited to continue honing her freshwater ecology skills while working with the local community to protect these vital ecosystems.



Gardening Tips for Surviving the Harsh Australian Summer

Summer can be a challenging time for gardeners and plants alike. To ensure that both you and your garden thrive despite the heat, here are some tips:

Plant Selection

Choose plants that can withstand the intense Australian summer. Bottlebrush, Acacias, and Eucalypts have tough, leathery leaves that help them endure high temperatures. Look for plants with features that indicate heat resistance, such as:

- Succulents that store water in their leaves or stems.
- Needle-like leaves.
- Grey leaves.
- Furry-leaved plants like Emu Bush (Eremophila sp.).

Pot Plant Care

For potted plants, move them into the shade or group them together to provide mutual shade. Direct sunlight on black pots can harm plant roots. If a potted plant is severely stressed by heat, submerge the entire pot in a bucket of water. Once the air bubbles stop, the root-ball is fully saturated and the plant can recover.

Creating Shelter

It's crucial to create shelter in your garden. If you lack big, shady trees, fast-growing plants can provide much-needed cover for heat-sensitive plants. Wattles are excellent for this purpose.

You can also create a mini shadehouse by hanging shadecloth off the side of your deck or using stakes and shadecloth to cover large plants. For smaller plants, use palm fronds or prunings stuck into the soil to provide some relief from the sun.

Watering Tips

Water restrictions are common in Australia, so it's important to use water efficiently. Water deeply and early in the morning to allow the water to soak into the soil and create a reservoir for hot days. If you see a plant under severe moisture stress (e.g., drooping leaves), act quickly. Wet the foliage to cool it down and use a watering can to deliver water slowly and evenly around the plant.

After watering, retain moisture by applying a 50-millimeter layer of mulch on the soil surface. This will reduce evaporation and suppress weeds that compete for moisture.

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Remembering the 'Barmera – Waikerie' Beaufort Bomber

TUCKED away in the Waikerie RSL Museum as part of the RAAF display is a photo and press release from The River News, dated Wednesday 16 August 1995, which details the war effort made by the towns of Barmera and Waikerie in the provision of the 'Barmera – Waikerie' Beaufort bomber.

As World War II began to threaten Australia, the Australian aircraft industry from its fledgling infancy grew in size, until in 1941 it manufactured 724 Beaufort bombers, one of the most formidable aircrafts of the war.

The Beaufort A9-500 was the 500th Australian made and commissioned aircraft during World War II, and was given the name 'Barmera – Waikerie' to honour the towns that had provided the financial means

for its construction.

The people of Barmera and Waikerie had raised over 30,000 pounds sterling, having fulfilled their third victory loan quota.

This was seen as quite an honour for any towns, but especially for the small towns of Barmera and Waikerie at this time.

In addition to this plane, a Beaufort named the 'Berri – Loxton' bomber was won in the previous second victory loan subscription of 30,000 pounds.

These four towns were the only towns in South Australia to have had planes named after them.

The monies were raised through the sale of war bonds administered by the Commonwealth War Loans Office.

The war loans scheme encouraged Australians to

buy war bonds that would mature with interest after the war.

Production would be carried out between 1941 and 1944 at Fishermen's Bend, Melbourne, and Mascot, Sydney.

The Pratt and Whitney R-1830 Twin Wasp engine fitted to these aircraft would be built by the Commonwealth Aircraft Corporation (CAC).

The State Railway Workshops of Victoria, New South Wales, and South Australia were building sub-assemblies and components.

This was a major undertaking for Australia and the original plan was to build aircraft for both the United Kingdom's Royal Air Force, and the Royal Australian Air Force.

The first 58 were issued RAF serials although only seven were delivered to the RAF, with the remainder going to the RAAF and being re-serialled A9-1 onwards.

With Australian production from A9-50 on, even-numbered serials came from Mascot and those with odd numbers from Fishermen's Bend.

This means the 'Barmera – Waikerie' bomber was built in Mascot, Sydney.

The Beaufort Bomber was a formidable aircraft able to match the Japanese Mitsubishi Zero fighter with

similar speed, and saw plenty of action in the Pacific theatre of war.

The 'Barmera – Waikerie' bomber was part of No.15 Squadron and was crewed by flight lieutenant Harry Silcock 403843, flight officer Alfred Sage 437010, navigator and flight officer John Baxter 424723, and wireless telegraphy operator, and pilot officer, Joseph Siddal 411233.

Air gunner and flight officer Sage, of Renmark, was pleased when told it was named the 'Barmera – Waikerie'.

The plane, as recalled

by Mrs Sage, was the first Beaufort bomber to land at Renmark.

No. 15 squadron was a RAAF light bomber and maritime squadron of World War II.

It was active from 1944 to 1946 and was stationed in New Guinea from March 1945.

Its duties in New Guinea included anti-submarine and anti-barge patrols, mail runs, supply drops, and attacking Japanese positions.

On completion of the war, the nose art recorded seven supply drops and 15 bombing missions successfully

completed.

After the war the A9-500 was placed into storage on 1 October 1945, and struck off charge in August 1945.



The below was a speech given by Waikerie Football Club's (WFC) Build Committee chair Brendan Sidhu at the soft opening of the new Waikerie Community Hub, which was held last weekend...

10 years in the making

IT'S my pleasure to welcome you all.

A special welcome to local members Tony Pasin and Tim Whetstone, Loxton Waikerie District Council (LWDC) CEO David Beaton, deputy major Jodie Flavel and all our local councillors, life members, builder Mitch Wood, and his wife Marina.

WFC board Sue, Sam, Aaron, Henry, Benton Kay, Tim, Chris D, Chris Liebich, George, Brian, and Nathan, and Building Management Committee members Henry, KF, Beaver, Aaron, and Tim.

A very warm welcome to WFC members, sponsors, supporters and guests.

I thought I'd spend a little bit of time on our journey and how we got here today.

This facility was 10 years in the making. In fact, the first committee was formed back in 2015, by Henry C, Brenton K, Lauren Oswald/Bevan, Jen Nitschke, Steve Liebich and I.

I had a dream to build on the river, and Henry said I have the same dream.

We presented to the then council and they were supportive of an upgrade and new build. We needed to go away and get some plans and a budget, and get back to them.

Henry and I started to negotiate a new build on the river but were told that we would never get approval to build there by the previous LWDC CEO. It was also at a time when we were encouraged to move to the rec oval.

Given our budget, we were looking to build a glorified shed.

We then met with the new LWDC CEO David Beaton and a grant writer, and applied for a \$1.5m grant.

We secured the \$1.5m in federal funding thanks to Tony Pasin. This needed to be matched with cash and some in-kind support. To ensure we could match the funding we needed to get a loan from LWDC of \$500,000, WFC to put in money, and then if there was a shortfall several members guaranteed to put in \$10,000 or \$20,000. I must say a big thank you for the unanimous support of LWDC and the terms of the generous loan.

We engaged JBG Architects, who drew up plans for a facility much better than a tin shed on the site of the old rooms, after deliberating on a couple of sites.

We met Mitch Wood to remove the old building, and he ended up as our builder.

It was a meeting with the council, with all councillors in attendance at the old club rooms, that helped change to the site we are at today.

We showed them our plans. A councillor asked had we considered all sites.

David Beaton told me after the meeting that we could build at the river. It is a process, but will take more time.

They say it takes a village to bring up a

child. It has taken much more to get this facility funded and built.

It would not have happened without the funding we secured from both the Federal and State Governments, and for the support of the WFC board. It was a huge decision to agree to take on such a loan.

Special thanks to Tony Pasin and Tim Whetstone for supporting and pushing for the successful securing of the grants. Both \$1.5m each.

Thanks to the WFC board directors at the time, Gilda Carter, Sue Miller, George Smith, Henry C, Aaron T, Tim B, and Shawn N for the support. I don't know of any other volunteer-run organisations in Riverland who would be able to do this.

It was really important to the WFC to try and use our local trades where we could, and it was great that Hansen Electrical, Paschke Electrical and Waikerie Plumbing have been very much involved in this build. They have gone above and beyond to help create this brilliant building. Thanks to David Neindorf, Graham and Sam Pashke, and Tom Baker and their terrific staff, some who are here.

Thanks to LWDC for your generous loan and continuing support.

Special thanks to David Beaton for his counsel and guidance. It's been a great ride. A big huge thank you to Daniel Brown, who was the project manager. He met with us onsite once a fortnight during the build. We could not have done it without you. I really don't know what we were thinking.

We are proud of the building that Mitch and his team have built. It is overwhelming to see the level of pride and ownership Mitch, his team and our local trades have displayed during the build, and this continues today after handing the keys over.

To our sponsors, our volunteers and to anyone who helped with your time, or putting your hand in your pocket, a big or little thank you to all or you.

I need to make special mention of Gary and Wendy Pfeiler, and Chris and Shane Devito, for their generous donation of the pavers, and to Richard and Steve Pfeiler for freighting them from Adelaide to site.

Also thank you to our major sponsors for tonight, Farm House Fresh, Linke and Mitolo families, Growers Wine Group, Accolade, Gary F, Chris D and KF for the wines.

This will be a great facility for our community. To everyone who has helped on the way this is a fantastic legacy you have all done for our community.

Crackdown on stalking: new reforms to help victims

STATE-wide reforms, covering the Riverland and developed in consultation with victim support services and the justice sector have lowered the threshold required to prove the offence of stalking, making it easier for authorities to act against perpetrators.

In a bid to capture a broader range of harmful stalking activities, the reformed stalking offence will cover stalking with intent to cause any physical or mental harm instead of only serious physical or mental harm.


Attorney-General Kyam Maher said "these changes will help to hold perpetrators to account, and also better

define what constitutes this type of offending".

"These reforms also update the types of behaviours that can be considered stalking and harassment, to ensure new and emerging forms of technology – such as using devices to track a person's movements or to monitor their communications – are also covered," Mr Maher said.

The newly passed reforms will also ensure offences will apply even if an offender "did not specifically intend to cause harm or fear, but should reasonably have known that the conduct would be likely to cause harm or fear"

To address misconcep-

tions about what the types of behaviour that constitute stalking, the offence will now also be known as 'stalking and harassment' – which incorporates broader activities that can constitute the offence, including harassment via communication and surveillance technologies.

Funding available for Riverland community environmental projects

APPLICATIONS for the 2025-26 Grassroots Grants program are now aimed to support Riverland community-led grassroots environmental projects.

An initiative of the Murraylands and Riverland Landscape Board (MRLB), Grassroots Grants support the community to undertake projects and activities that help build the environmental resilience and sustainability of the region.

Applications are invited from community organisations, volunteer groups, local government, schools and education providers, First Nations groups, NGOs, landholders, and individuals in the Riverland region.

Funding can be used towards activities such as revegetation, weed control, training, citizen science, small equipment purchases, environmental surveys and community events.

MRLB chair Frances Simes encouraged the community to consider ways to improve the sustainability of their local environment.

“Now’s a great time to think about a local project you’d like to tackle – it could be developing a biodiverse shelter belt on farm, or removing weeds from a waterway,” she said.

“Grassroots Grants can also be used to improve the knowledge, understanding and

capacity of the community. This could be by hosting a workshop to support farmers during dry times, or organising a wetland study tour for a school or kindy group.

“This year, just over \$500,000 is available through the Grassroots Grants, so we encourage all eligible applicants to consider how the funding could support their project ideas.”

To be eligible for funding projects need to align with at least one of the focus areas in the landscape board’s Regional Landscape Plan, and applicants are encouraged to discuss their project ideas with landscape board staff before completing their application.

Grassroots Grants funding is available across three value ranges — \$1000 and under, \$1001 to \$10,000 and \$10,001 and above.

The Grassroots Grant program is funded through the landscape levies, reinvesting levy payer contributions to support the health the Riverland region.

Applications are open until 30 March 2025.

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

Crows kicking goals for kids in important programs

YOUNG Riverlanders in child protection programs have the chance to travel to Adelaide Crows home games this season through a partnership with the State Government.

Announced last week, the Adelaide Football Club is pledging 500 tickets to children and young people in care for its AFL home games in season 2025.

The pledge, through the Adelaide Crows Foundation's Crows Care Program, builds on a growing partnership between the club and the Department for Child Protection (DCP).

Under the scheme, the Foundation will provide 25 tickets to DCP for distribution, and another 25 to non-government care providers, each home game.

The State Government has so far invested more than \$580m into the child protection and family support system, funding a range of programs that support children and young people in care.

The commitment from the Adelaide Crows Foundation falls under a wider partnership between DCP and the Office for Recreation, Sport and Racing (ORSR) to engage children and young people in contact with the child protection

and family support system in sport, recognising the mental, physical and emotional wellbeing benefits this provides.

Minister for Child Protection, Katrine Hildyard said "young people deserve to make the connections they do through sport, no matter the situation they find themselves in."

"Like all young people, children in contact with the child protection and family support system deserve to be safe, loved, nurtured and afforded the best opportunities to participate in and enjoy community life," she said.

"Sport is a powerful part of community life in South Australia; it helps people know that they are not alone, that they belong and that there is a community of people

there for them, and sport can be so uplifting.

"Watching the Crows empowers and inspires, and being part of the Crows community can help improve the lives of the children and families cheering them on from the Adelaide Oval stands.

"Our government is committed to getting kids active – that includes kids who have not always had the opportunity to be involved in sport and who benefit most from being included."

Minister for Recreation, Sport and Racing Emily Bourke said the program would help young people feel included.

"Working with organisations like the Crows gives young people a way to engage in sport that they may otherwise miss out on," she

said. "This initiative demonstrates the wide-ranging benefits of turning our plan into action, partnering with the community to improve accessibility and support children in care."

Adelaide Crows Foundation chairperson Kate Thiele said the club's foundation serves an important purpose for young people.

"The Adelaide Crows Foundation is committed to using the power of sport to make a positive impact on the lives of local children and youth," she said.

"Following the success of our partnership with the DCP over the past two years, we are proud to continue this important initiative to give children in care the opportunity to experience the joy of footy."

RECORD SUPER BOWL AUDIENCE, REACHES 2.6 MILLION...

EAGLES' SUPER BOWL VICTORY SOARS HIGH FOR SEVEN

THE biggest sporting event in the US this year, Super Bowl LIX, scored with Australians, with the Seven Network's live and free broadcast on Seven and 7plus Sport reaching 2.6 million people.
